

Columbia Steel Plant Combines With Geneva

A further step in simplifying the corporate structure of United States Steel became effective January 1, when Columbia Steel Company in California and Geneva Steel Company in Utah were combined into a single operating division of United States Steel Company, a subsidiary of United States Steel Corporation. The division is now known as the Columbia-Geneva Steel Company.

Another western subsidiary, Consolidated Western Steel Corporation, has become the consolidated Western Steel Division of United States Steel Company. Alden G. Roach, who serves as president of both Columbia and Consolidated Western, is president of these two new operating divisions. Roach emphasized that the reorganization is entirely internal in nature.

On the same date all of the corporation's wholly owned subsidiaries relating to mining and steel production, fabrication and distribution became general operating divisions of United States Steel Company. The names of the new operating divisions correspond in most cases to those of the present subsidiaries involved in the internal reorganization.

Other former subsidiary companies operating in the west which are now divisions of United States Steel Company are: American Steel and Wire Division; Gerrard Steel Strapping Division; Oil Well Supply Division; United States Steel Products Division; United States Steel Supply Division and American Bridge Division.

In announcing the internal reorganization on November 3, effective January 1, Irving S. Olds, chairman of the Board of United States Steel Corporation, said that the effort is designed to constitute another step in the continual process of keeping United States Steel as up to date as possible in all phases of its organization and operations.

Rep. Cecil King Will Address Legion Meeting

Cecil R. King, Congressman from the 17th District, which includes Torrance, will address the monthly meeting of the Los Angeles County Council of the American Legion. The meeting will be held Friday night, January 4, 8:00 p.m., at Patriotic Hall, 1816 South Figueroa Street.

Congressman King is a member of the House Ways and Means committee, and Chairman of a sub-committee investigating irregularities in the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

The Democratic Representative is a veteran of World War I and a Legionaire and has been a Congressman since 1942, being reelected to four additional terms. Prior to taking office he was a prominent Los Angeles businessman.

Congressman King's investigation into the tax scandals have been termed as "making the Kefauver probe seem like a soft summer breeze by comparison." In a recent statement concerning the tax investigations, Representative King stated that "this is the first time since the early days of Andrew Mellon as Secretary of the Treasury that a Congressional Committee has investigated the Treasury Department from a revenue standpoint."

"Our authority directs us to go into the administrations, procedures and regulations of the Internal Revenue Bureau, and we intend to pull no punches." Among the men under fire by King's committee are: Charles Oliphant, resigned chief counsel of the Internal Revenue bureau; Henry Grunewald, mysterious man about Washington, and T. Lamar Caudle, former assistant attorney general.

This important American Legion meeting, to be presided over by County Council Commander Joseph F. McCann, will be attended by Legion dignitaries and other officials from throughout the Southern California area.

Funeral services were held December 26 for Clarence Albert Blake, 40, a Torrance resident for nearly five years, who died December 21, at Harbor General hospital.

He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Isabell Leets, and Mrs. Irene Kendall, and a brother, John Blake, all of Michigan. For many years Mr. Blake had been employed as a longshoreman.

Injection Well Experiment Will Start Oct. 1st

Full scale operation of the West Basin injection well project to start about Oct. 1. Further plans for the project were made last week at a meeting of water officials, including W. C. Farquhar, president of the West Basin Municipal Water District, and Ben Haggott, president of the West Basin Water Association, a producers organization.

Included in the preparations for the experiment is the laying of a 20-inch steel line 7300 feet in length to supply five injection wells in Manhattan and Hermosa Beach. Twenty-five observation wells also will be constructed.
