

Tartars Lose Bay Opener

Torrance and Leuzinger, pre-season choices for the Bay League's most likely not to succeed honors, meet tomorrow night in Lawdale in the second league encounter for both. Preliminary tipoff is at 7 p.m.

Both the Tartars and the Olympians took it on the chin last Friday night in the Bay League curtain raiser, Torrance falling to Inglewood 53-31, and Redondo bouncing Leuzinger by a 42-32 count.

Santa Monica ran all over Beverly Hills, 44-29, in the other first-night tilt.

Saturday night the Tartars return to the local floor to take on the high-flying Santa Monica Vikings in a game which should be close only during the first five seconds.

Samohi's basketball crew, manned chiefly by footballers, has taken over where the griders left off. They have run roughshod over all opposition and won the San Diego prep tourney last month.

Last Friday's Torrance-Inglewood game was an all-round fiasco. Neither team looked good and officials Dave Schwartz and Bob Tabing looked worse.

Add to that an ice-cold, poorly lighted gym and you have almost the complete picture.

What had been a sloppy but close game in the first half, blew higher than the top of Mount Everest in the second half.

Inglewood led 22:17 at halftime, although the Tartars had hit on but two field goal tries in the first 16 minutes. The Sentinels got nicked for 17 personal fouls in this half, and probably should have had at least another 10 called by the inconsistent referees.

Inglewood got three quick points as the half opened, then Torrance got them back when Jack O' Cain dumped in a lay-in and added a free throw. Just as the Tartars fans' hopes went up, so did the team.

The Tartars then embarked upon a series of wild passes, muffed scoring chances and generally bad play. Inglewood repeatedly cashed in and ran up the count.

Most of the second half was dedicated to seeing how many players each man could trip as the game got away from the officials. O' Cain and Chic Cope got the bounce via five fouls, as did three Sentinels.

A good number of the fouls committed by both teams in the second half were for pushing and tripping — neither of which can be classed as either accidental or made while scrambling for the ball.

Some of the boys apparently preferred the sound of a player bouncing off the floor to the normal sound of the ball doing the same thing.

Inglewood's height advantage and the backboards was one of the deciding factors in the decisive score. The loss of O' Cain, who picked up foul No.

Sportsman's Calendar

The Department of Fish and Game reminds California sportsmen of the following general regulations which apply to current hunting and fishing:

Bears.—No closed season or bag limit in Del Norte, Humboldt and Mendocino counties.

Jack Rabbits.—Closed in Southern California districts 4, 4 1/2, 4 3/4, 19, 20 and 22. No closed season elsewhere. No bag limit.

Waterfowl.—Ends January 5 along Colorado River; closed elsewhere. Bag and possession limits: 6 ducks, 6 geese, 15 coots, 25 mergansers; no more than 1 wood duck, 2 Canada geese or subspecies; 2 white-fronted geese or 3 brant. Shooting hours: one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

Steelhead trout and salmon.—Ends January 31 in specified waters of Siskiyou and Trinity counties. Bag limit: 3 trout or salmon or combination. Ends February 29 in specified waters. Bag limit: 2 trout or salmon or combination in most areas.

Catfish.—No closed season. Bag limit: 15 pounds and one fish. Night fishing permitted in Siskiyou, Shasta, Lake and Murdoc counties. Minimum size limit in Clear Lake only: 9 inches.

Black bass, sunfish, crappie, Sacramento perch.—Bag limits: 5 black bass, 25 sunfish, crappie, perch. Local exceptions. No size limits.

Striped bass.—No closed season. Bag limit: 5 fish or 25 pounds and one fish, or 2 fish regardless of weight. Minimum size limit: 12 inches.


Ocean fish.—No closed season in Pacific Ocean for salmon, trout, rockfish, tuna, yellowtail, marlin, broadbill swordfish, black sea bass, barracuda white sea bass, bonito, rock bass, sand bass, kelp bass, halibut, corbina, croaker, lingcod and cabezone. Bag limits: 3 trout or salmon north of Monterey-San Luis Obispo county line; 2 south; 15 in aggregate but not more than 10 of any one of other species listed above.

Grunion.—No bag or size limits. May be taken on beach or in surf by hand only. No appliances or holes which may entrap grunion may be used.

Clams.—Bag limits: 10 plismo, 30 razor, 10 big neck, 10 Washington; no limit on jack knife clams.

Cockles.—Bag limits: 60. Minimum size limit: 1 1/2 inches.
