Guard Seeks Pre-Draft Age Recruits

An appeal for young men to investigate the offerings of the California National Guard was issued this week by Maj. Gen. Earle M. Jones, Adjutant General of California.

Maj. Gen. Jones explained the new Selective Service regulations which permitted young men between the ages of 17-18 1/2 to enlist with the assurance that they will not be drafted after enlisting. The same applies to men over 20.

The general explained that such provisions were made because the government realized the importance of a strong National Guard in a sound National Defense structure.

"We the undersigned do agree to return to our jobs with the understanding of an immediate settlement (two weeks)," the petition read.

Management claims that under the terms of the present contract they can not legally put the matter to grievance, which is what the Union has asked, as long as a work stoppage exists.

The local Union officials also ask the two men be reinstated and paid retroactive pay from the date they were dismissed.

A company spokesman said yesterday afternoon that the 24-day shutdown has resulted in the loss of production of 17,000 tons of steel.

In an attempt to obtain the news at its source, the Herald wired Phil Murray, president of the CIO at his headquarters in Pittsburgh, Pa., Tuesday night. Up to press time last night, no answer had been received.

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
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
