Award of the Combat Medical Badge to Pfc. Ronald L. Hazelwood, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Hazelwood, was announced by the Army yesterday.

Hazelwood, a former Torrance High School student, is a medical aid man in the 32nd Infantry Regiment serving in Korea. He entered the Army Feb. 19, 1951.

The young soldier, who was sent overseas last October, has also been awarded the Korean Service Ribbon with one campaign star since his arrival in Korea.

His parents, former Torrance residents, now live in Bellflower. The Combat Medical Badge is a symbol of the frontline combat medical aidmen, the Army said when announcing the award. It is silver in color and consists of a miniature cross on a Medical Corps caduceus superimposed over a wreath.

Soldier Places High in Contest For New Singer


