### NEW HOURS NOW LAW

New California sports laws went into effect with the coming of the first of March, the State Department of Fish and Game reminded this week.

The number one thing to remember, says the State, is the new shooting hour regulations. Officially, the Commission of Fish and Game law reads:

"Shooting hours for all species of resident game shall be one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset except between November 22 and December 1, inclusive, when shooting hours will be from 8 a.m. to 4:40 p.m. in all counties lying north of San Luis Obispo, Kern and San Bernardino."

Waterfowl hunting hours are not affected by the new rulings for taking resident game.

The freshman twirler also collected one hit for three tries at the plate. Shortstop Bill Crawford was the big scorer of the afternoon, however, pounding out one hit, but scoring twice.

Leech will throw in his prize starters today in an attempt to do more than merely reverse the prior scoring.

The locals are priming for the first BIG home contest of the season, that with the Narbonne High stickers on the Torrance Park diamond, Friday evening, March 14.

Coach Cliff Graybehl's junior varsity outfit was unable to overcome Mira Costa's four-run rally in the third frame and went down to a 4 to 3 defeat on the MC diamond Thursday.

### Stock Cars To Grind At Carrell

Stock cars will grind their way over a 100-mile championship race at Carrell Speedway Sunday afternoon in the greatest stock car get-together ever staged in the Southland, according to racing officials.

Carrell's banked curves and firm clay surface will allow passing on the corners and a smooth surface during the entire gruelling race with no pitfalls to slow the cars, one official said.

Lincoln, Fords, Chevies, Henry J's and the Hudson Hornet will pit their speed against the Olds 88. The Olds has dominated stock car racing all over the country for the past year.

A field of 30 cars is expected to contest in the classic 100-mile.

Admission is \$1.50 for bleachers, \$2.50 for grandstand. Kids under 12 are admitted free if accompanied by an adult.
