

War Mothers Seek Help In Forming Escort Group

A call for volunteers to help organize a hospital escort unit to wheel patients to and from clinics in Veterans' hospitals was issued this week by Mrs. Jeanette King, recently re-elected president of the American War Mothers in this district.

Mrs. King explained that the local chapter, which includes members from Lomita, Waverly and Torrance, were seeking enough volunteers to form a unit of six to eight women who could serve escort duty when called on.

"To be able to get this number at the hospital at a certain time, we would need a group of about 20 women from which to call for help,"

Any mother who has had a son or daughter in the service since 1941 is eligible for membership," Mrs. King reports. Information about the group may be obtained from Mrs. King at Terminal 4-4988 or Mrs. Albert Sandstrom at Lomita 1022 W.

### National Supply's Defense Role Told In Report to Stockholders

Reports that one-half of the defense production of the National Supply Co. in 1951 came out of the Torrance plant were made this week by A. E. Walker, president of the huge firm when he released the annual report to stockholders.

Direct defense production "amounted to \$6,500,000," Walker told stockholders. "Half of this volume came out of our Torrance plant, where gun tubes and aircraft parts are manufactured in addition to heavy machinery for the oil industry."

He said the company still held \$9,000,000 worth of unfilled defense orders.

"The company's annual report stated that 40 per cent of the Torrance plant's volume in 1951 was deliberately switched to markets other than oil producers, the firm's main line of business."

"Through its unusual combination of steel-making and machine facilities, Torrance served the steel, copper, aluminum, piping and shipbuilding industries of the Far West and the Pacific coast with castings, forgings and heavy machinery. It is the largest integrated plant of its kind on the west coast," the report said.
