Services Held For Youthful Suicide Victim

Funeral services were conducted yesterday morning for Gosta Karl Peterstrom, 27, who died of a .45 caliber bullet hole in his head late Thursday evening. Peterstrom was found lying in a field near Del Amo Ave. and the extension of Inglewood Ave. by Clifford Willetta, Redondo Beach, who notified Torrance Police.

The victim was rushed to Harbor Hospital where he lived for twelve hours.

Officers said that Joe Hatfield, 4800 W. 100th St., reported that Peterstrom, a boarder, left a note at his place stating that he was contemplating suicide. An hour later he was found in the grassy field.

Surviving him is his wife, Mildred, from whom he had been separated, who resides in Manhattan Beach.

Private cremation followed the services at Stone and Myers Chapel here.

Induction of college students is still being postponed by all draft boards until the end of the school year, according to Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel at El Camino College. A recent release from Selective Service Headquarters stated that no change had occurred in the 1948 act which made it mandatory for draft boards to postpone the induction of all full-time college students.

By maintaining average grades or better, college students may stay in school until completion of requirements for a degree before being inducted.

Posters giving directions to the nearest shelter have been posted in all classrooms and corridors, and first aid classes have been formed to instruct students in treating injuries. In addition, Mrs. Claire Maddox, school nurse, has been registering and classifying students for disaster relief work.

Local Sailor Sees Action In Sub 'War'

"Enemy" submariner Leo S. Masterson, radioman second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo W. Masterson, 616 E. Carson St., is gaining added respect for convoy escorts during the Atlantic Fleet's current Convex III maneuver.

Assigned aboard the submarine Piper for the "enemy" role, he is among sailors from 46 states' manning 13 submarines in the convoy exercise. Added respect came as a result of surface warship counter measures during early attacks. Several attacking submarines lost active status when they were detected and beaten to the punch by convoy-protecting escorts.

The Convex III exercise, which began Feb. 25, is a giant training maneuver in the control and protection of shipping. Submarines comprise most "enemy" forces. They fill realistic assignments by stalking opposing units while they simulate wartime convoy duties.
