

Dr. P. Lindstrom, Bergman's 'Ex,' May Leave Harbor Hospital Staff

Dr. Peter Lindstrom, chief of the Department of Neurosurgery at Harbor General Hospital, has been offered a post as head of the Department of Neurosurgery at Aspinwall Veterans Hospital near Pittsburgh, Pa., it was revealed this week.

Dr. Lindstrom, former husband of actress Ingrid Bergman, indicated that he would accept the offer but would not make a formal announcement until final confirmation was received from the Veterans Administration in Washington, D. C.

A native of Sweden, Dr. Lindstrom became an American citizen in November, 1949, just one year before he divorced Ingrid Bergman, who is now the wife of Roberto Rossellini, Italian film director.

Population Jumps But Fire Losses Show Drop in 1951

Although the population jumped considerably and the number of homes has increased steadily, the fire losses for 1951 were below those recorded in 1950, Fire Chief J. J. Benner reported this week in the chief's annual report.

Mercantile fires accounted for the biggest drop; the fire fighters battled only seven last year as compared with 47 in the previous period.

Total alarms answered by engines in the department were 330 in 1951, or less than one per day. In 1950, 365 alarms were reported.

The estimated loss last year was only \$20,736 as compared with \$33,117 in 1950.

Service offered by the department has steadily improved with the addition of new modern equipment and the completion of a North Torrance fire station to augment the headquarters companies and the Walteria crew, Benner said.


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
