


CAMINO SWATS TECH



Ten Runs In Sixth Inning Breaks Harbor

Harbor pulled into an early lead in the second frame when they drove in two runs, but the Warriors were too much for Tech hunder Fred Cootes and blasted out three runs in the third.

A fourth-inning lone run coked the Warriors into a bigger lead.

But in the last of the sixth, after thrower Sid Eby held the visitors to two runs, which tied the ball game 4 all, coach Doug Essick's crew stormed all over the bases tallying ten runs.

Harbor pulled pitchers left and right and though they kept the Caminomen in tow for the rest of the day, the ten-run sixth had already done the damage.

Eby went the rounds on the mound for El Camino and Ted Rojas did the catching duties for the nine innings.

SHOWING POOR IN EM RELAY

Tracksters from Torrance High made only a slight scratch on the record slate at the El Monte relays Friday afternoon as Burbank High came through to out-nudge favored Long Beach Wilson by 2 1/2 points.

The Torrance High crew failed to score despite the efforts of several good Cox Tartarabes.

Scoring for the local crew found them tied with El Monte for next to the last spot with one point for varsity and tied for last with one-half counter for Bee competition.

Picking up the single point for the varsity was the four-man mile relay squad who came in fourth. Anaheim High trounced the distance in 3m. 35.2, which only came within 1.1s. of matching the existing standard.

Varsity men on the squad were

Ted Marcoux, Lee Mortenson, Bill Crawford and Doug Foulger. None of the Bay League squads entered in the CIF run fest fared well in the final standings; only Inglewood made a sizable entry in varsity competition placing fourth in Class A timings.

Santa Monica tied with Montebello with 2 1/2 points for eleventh place.

In Bee events Santa Monica chalked up a fifth position and Redondo tied with Pasadena for sixth spot.

No Bay League teams were even able to make the scoring column in Class Cee competition.

Observers of prep track and field squads throughout the Southland begin to wonder when Bay League outfits get pushed around like an Austin trying to out-nudge a ten-ton truck. Schools in these parts consistently come up with top-notch grid crews in the fall, but evidence of demphasis of track is certainly obvious.
