### 300,000 Golfers Will Clash With Ben Hogan Soon

Here's a new one. An estimated 300,000 golfers throughout America will each play an 18-hole round against the U. S. Open Champion Ben Hogan on Saturday, May 31. During this unique one-day tournament, to be known nationwide as "National Golf Day," Hogan will match woods and irons with every golfer—man, woman or child "duffer" or expert. Each challenger is permitted his present bona fide handicap rating.

Playing under USGA rules, Hogan will shoot an 18-hole round at the Northwood Club, Dallas, Texas.

At the same time on the fairways of the nation's 4970 public and private courses, America's week-end golfers and their pros will try to beat Ben's round.

The contestants that do will be awarded a specially-cast bronze medal inscribed: "I Beat Ben Hogan, National Golf Day, May 31, 1952."

Golf Day is sponsored by Life Magazine and the Professional Golfers Association, and the \$1 entry fee charged each contestant will be donated in equal shares to the USO and the National Golf Fund.

### Inglewood Varsity Sweeps to Victory

Wind and rain swept the field during the running of the Bay League track finals at El Camino College Friday afternoon, and so did Inglewood High School.

For the Sentinels completely outclassed all varsity foes by latching on to some 71 points. Santa Monica was second with scarcely more than half the number tallied by Inglewood. Redondo totaled 34½, Beverly Hills 27, Torrance 6 and Leuzinger 4.

In Class 4B running, however, the Tartars came through with 23 tallies to record a third for the 1952 Bay League finals. Santa Monica was the victor with 50 1/3, Redondo 44½, Torrance 28, Leuzinger 25 5/6, Beverly Hills 9 1/3 and Inglewood 6.

The Tartars tripped into the third place in Class Cee competition also, running behind Santa Monica, 57½; Beverly Hills, 21, and nosing out Inglewood 15, Leuzinger 13½, and Redondo 11½.

Rain and a strong southwest gale slowed most clockings to very impressive marks. Best event of the day was the Bee 1320, when Redondo's Vice Equin scooted to a 3m., 26.5s. win nearly thirty-five yards ahead of other foes. Torrance's Hector Herrera came in fourth in this event.

The local Class Cee relay four some met with tough luck when Dennis Hester slipped on the final stretch of the 440-yard mile and skidded around in the cozy muck.

Bill Crawford and Joe Rojas picked up fourth and fifth place points for their varsity cohorts in the mile, with Crawford passing Rojas in the last of the third lap. Crawford came from last place to capture fourth, and if he had opened up a little sooner, might have cracked third.

Rojas nosed out a Santa Monica galloper at the wire to squeeze in "in the money."

Next step for the Tartars is the CIF Southern Section Meet to be run May 3 with the top three winners in each event contesting with those from other CIF leagues.

Class Bee and Cee field events finals were held last Tuesday at the qualifying heats for the track festivities.

Tuesday afternoon the locals host Leuzinger's varsity baseball crew for a skirmish in the rapidly closing 1952 horsehide race. The first place will be thrown at 3 p.m.

Starting off the first frame in Thursday's clash with a bang, the Tartars popped over two runs to tie it up with Inglewood at 2 a.m. Torrance held the Sentinels in tow until the fourth when two singles filled first and second, a base on balls loaded the sacks and another swat drove in two runners.

Tartar shortstop Bill Crawford, the second Tartar up to bat, was the first to score early in the initial frame. Pitcher Charlie Camou, who followed Crawford on the batting list, tallied the second run for the Tartars.

Their only other counter of the day was credited to Burt Smith, who doubled and later scored when Joe White socked a two-baser driving Smith across the plate.

Inglewood's Bob Burlingame hurled the full seven-inning stint, as did Camou for the locals. Burlingame gave up three free passes, allowed 8 hits and struck out 5. Camou walked one, turned back 5 at the plate and was charged with 11 hits.

The locals will be meeting Leuzinger Tuesday for the second time, the Olympiads topped a 3-0 win in the last outing. On the mound Coach Dick Leech probably will start young Manuel Olloque, who took a rest during the last fray.
