# El Camino Expansion Given Green Light

El Camino College Board, given the "go-ahead" by local voters in the building tax election Friday, May 16, has announced that the next step in the college building program will be the construction of vocational and commercial units on the local campus.

Voters approved a second five year tax to continue the college building program, which school officials estimate will approximately complete a college capable of housing a student body of 10,000.

In a statement issued on behalf of the college administration, board of trustees and college employees, Forrest G. Murdock, El Camino College president, said that the tax issue which passed by more than a two-to-one majority, would enable the school to complete its planned program and the college "family" was greatly appreciative of the vote of confidence given the work of the school by the voters of the community.

The college president said that the school would work to

merit the continued support of the community, as it has worked in the past to provide service and education for the good of the residents of the college district.

A new life science building is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy June 15, according to a recent announcement. Work started on a new library building, planned to house 80,000 volumes, is well under way.

First on the program for the start of the current five-year building plan is an extension of the vocational facilities on the campus. This will be followed by a commercial wing which will be financed out of money provided by the tax extension.


