

### Wall Street Journal Tells Story of Torrance Schools

Readers of the Wall Street Journal were given a run-down on Torrance's two new pre-cast schools last Thursday in a front-page story telling how the district had dropped the construction cost from the state average of \$14 to \$10.90 per square foot.

The story tells how an industrial architect, hired at the suggestion of the Dresser Equipment Co., recommended the pre-cast concrete construction.

It was pointed out by the Journal that a reduction of the insurance rate from \$1.46 to \$0.668 was also made possible with this type of construction.

The Journal told of the Southern California Edison Co.'s contribution by putting the transformers on telephone poles at a cost of about \$100 instead of putting them in the customary sunken vault which costs about \$2000.

Other economies incorporated into the two buildings included such items as the portable easels built by school carpenters which brought about considerable savings on blackboard installation, the Journal reported.

William H. Tolson, realtor and prominent Republican, 4920 Cravens St., has accepted chairmanship of the Torrance Warren for President Committee, it was announced today by Lionel T. Campbell, area chairman.

Tolson said he expects to see a large Torrance Warren committee formed prior to the primary election next Tuesday.
