Noted Musicians Guests for Annual Orchestra Concert

Joseph Piastro and Werner Gebauer, noted figures in the world of music, will add an international touch to the Torrance Concert Orchestra's last concert of the year Friday evening in the Torrance High School auditorium. Abe Milstein, orchestra conductor, has announced.
 Piastro, violinist, composer and teacher, will serve as guest-conductor for the evening performance, and Gebauer, the "distinguished violinist of two continents," will be featured as he presents the Wieniawski Concerto for violin and orchestra.
 The orchestra will be augmented with top studio players to make the concert the most successful of any given by the orchestra in its four years of public concerts, according to Milstein.
 Piastro, who left Czarist Russia, where he had studied the violin with many famous musicians, began his career in the music capitals of Europe, Asia and America. Only recently he appeared in a tour of recitals in Chicago and the east.
 Gebauer made his New York debut in Town Hall in 1937, at the age of 17, and arrived in this country through the offices of Bruno Walter and Arturo Toscanini.

Threat to Small Newspapers Seen In Price Raise

Fearful that scores of American newspapers would have to suspend operations, County Supervisor Raymond V. Darby this week issued a call to all elected officials in the county to bombard Washington with telegrams, urging immediate action in stabilizing the price of Canadian newsprint.
 Supervisor Darby's action followed an announcement that the price of newsprint—the paper which newspapers are printed on—had been raised \$10 a ton to a new high of \$126 a ton.
 "The \$126 a ton will place such a burden on smaller newspapers that many will have to suspend operations," Darby said.
 In a straight-forward resolution, passed unanimously by the Board of Supervisors, Darby said the sudden rise in cost of newsprint by Canadian manufacturers is threatening scores of American newspapers with suspending operations.
 The resolution urged that the House of Representatives Newsprint subcommittee, which is now studying the effects of the new Canadian price increase under Rep. Oren Harris, of Arkansas, to consider the possibility of requesting the State Department to carry on negotiations with the Canadian government in an attempt to work out some possible price stabilization of newsprint destined for this country.
 "Newsprint in free countries," Darby said, "are the voice and conscience of Democracy."
 "If scores of newspapers in America are forced to shut down operations because of the increase in the price of newsprint, it means the voice of Democracy slowly is being strangled," he continued.
 "We must, in concerted action, let the people of Canada and the Canadian government know how we feel if our newspapers in free America face strangulation because of the increased cost of newsprint."
 In his telegram to the subcommittee in Washington, Darby applauded the suggestion of Acting Chairman Harris of exploring the possibilities of developing greater newsprint production in the United States.
