Nearly One-Fourth of Average Income Goes for Federal Costs

"Nearly one-fourth of the income of the average Torrance family will go to pay the costs of the mushrooming Federal Government during the coming year if President Truman's \$85,000,000 spending program is carried out."

Donald M. Maher, chief cost accountant, Dresser Equipment Co. (IDECO DIV.) in Torrance, so declared yesterday, quoting from figures prepared by the economic research council of the National Association of Manufacturers.

"Right now the average Los Angeles County area family pays about 26 cents out of every dollar of income in federal taxes—direct and concealed. Under the President's proposed program almost 28 cents of every dollar would be needed for federal expenditures. For the average Los Angeles County area family this would amount to more than \$126 a month," Maher said.

Urging all Americans to demand economy and efficiency in federal spending Maher said, "If we fail to stop the monstrous growth of federal taxation and debt and inflation that feeds on excessive government spending, we are heading toward disaster." He termed this growth a "Threat against local government and freedom itself."

El Camino Prof Granted Ph.D.

Jacob H. Martin, distributive education instructor at El Camino College, has been granted a doctor of education degree by the University of Southern California, according to information received from the college. Martin has been a member of the El Camino faculty for three years and has been active in coordinating the college business program with chambers of commerce within the college district.

Martin is sponsor of the El Camino chapter of Future Business Leaders of America, a student business group, and is state chairman for the same organization.

Eleven More Rabid Dogs Found In East Los Angeles Districts

Eleven more rabid dogs have been apprehended in the eastern half of Los Angeles County during the past two weeks, bringing the total number of cases to 50 since the first of the year, Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, County health officer, said today.

Six cases occurred in East Los Angeles and the remainder in Whittier, Temple City, Bellflower and Bell Gardens.

Three areas in the County are potential "hot spots" because of rabid dogs running at large for several days before they were caught, the health officer said. He was of the opinion that more cases may develop in those areas in about 3 or 5 weeks.

Cover Wide Areas
One rabid dog had run from the City of Los Angeles through Monterey Park and San Gabriel. Another from East Los Angeles had traveled through Maywood, Bell, and Huntington Park to the Florence-Miramon district. The third rabid dog had escaped from his owner in Bellflower and covered a wide circle in the vicinity of Norwalk and Artesia.

Dr. Gilbert said that children should be impressed with the necessity of staying away from animals which do not belong to them. In order to escape the possibility of contracting rabies many children who have been bitten by animals have been given Pasteur treatment which is expensive, time-consuming and
