New YWCA Committee Chairmen Appointed

Named to fill the posts were: Mrs. Mervyn H. Porter, house; Mrs. L. A. McCoy, ways and means; Mrs. A. E. Palmer, dinner; Mrs. Lee Stamps, finance; Mrs. Walter Silence, worship and devotion; Mrs. William Armstrong, public affairs; Mrs. Floyd Miller, young adult; Mrs. Phelan Foley, camp, conference, convention, and world fellowship; Mrs. Stamps, Armstrong, and Solomon, personnel.

She stated that there were 565 Y-teens who attended the convention and of this number 101 were under 17 years old. The meeting on which she reported dealt with the results of a questionnaire sent to 27 associations. One question considered was, "What are the qualities necessary for a good life?"

The girls answering the questionnaire had said: honesty, integrity, faith in God, friendliness, understanding, sincerity, tolerance, ability to evaluate, courage and patience.

The Y-teens were then asked "What are the ways to develop these qualities?" Their answers were: having experiences both negative and positive, gaining ability to share, thinking less of self, and remembering the dignity of the human soul.

The Public Affairs committee headed by Mrs. Armstrong, with Mrs. Porter and Mrs. Stamps assisting, will study adequate lighting for an area adjacent to the building serving teenagers. Mrs. Stamps was appointed for a one-year term to fill the vacancy on the nominating committee. The group decided not to meet as a group during the summer, but to continue to carry on the necessary projects without a full committee meeting. Summer plans for the Y-teen clubs were reported by Mrs. Joseph Lukes, branch director, while Mrs. Palmer reviewed the dinner given by her committee. Mrs. Porter reported Beta Tri-Y-Teen club, had contributed money for the purchase of one chair for the building.
