Gebauer Scores Triumph In Torrance Concert

One of the world's great violinists appeared as soloist with the Torrance Concert Orchestra on June 6, when Werner Gebauer performed the Wieniawski Violin Concerto in D Minor. An ovation from the small but enthusiastic audience brought the young, handsome artist back for encores. The audience quickly recognized that here was a violinist of first-rate standing. Mr. Gebauer has a unique faculty for concealing an amazing technique behind the continual flow of a beautiful tone. Never does one become aware of the technical demands of a composition, but rather one is absorbed with the feeling of a forward motion of the melodic line.

Mr. Gebauer's stage presence and response to his audience was most gracious. This superb artist belongs on the concert stage as much as he does to Hollywood, where he has recently recorded the sound track for the television movie "Paganini".

Sharing the podium for this concert with Director Abe Milstein was Guest Conductor Josef Piastro, who directed the difficult violin concerto for Mr. Gebauer and brought an authoritative interpretation to Sibelius' tone poem, "Finlandia." Mr. Piastro, himself a violinist of artistic dimensions, directed the orchestra of 50 musicians through the intricate movements of the concerto, always in command of tempo and dynamics. It was a perfect example of the accomplishments attainable where soloist, conductor and orchestra are in accord with one another. Mr. Milstein took over the baton after the intermission and conducted Blue Tango, Granada, Danse Russe, Czardas and the Andalusian Suite. The concert was an artistic achievement for Torrance, and it is hoped that larger audiences will turn out for future concerts.
