School Library Does Landoffice Business Daily

Business at the Torrance Unified School District's library is good, according to Librarian Trudy Burbage. Total book circulation for the school year 1951-52 has doubled. Last year, 85,850 books were circulated as compared with 34,008 for the previous year. Distributed were 16,615 textbooks, 69,000 trade books and 150 state manuals. Audio-visual education, an important aid to the classroom teacher, utilized 2418 films during the school year. Los Angeles County also contributed to the visual education in supplying the schools with 150 models for instruction. Tape recorders, a recent addition to the educational program, were used on 55 different occasions. Finally, 2500 still pictures created scenes of learning for the pupils. Reason for this increase in business, Miss Burbage says, is credited to the daily book delivery, which makes it possible for the books to be where they are needed, when they are needed.

Milstein Leaves For Stanford For Year's Work

Abe Milstein, head of the music department at Torrance High School since it was separated from the Los Angeles School System five years ago, will spend the next year at Stanford working on his doctorate in musical education, he told the Herald this week. Milstein was granted a year's leave of absence by the Torrance Board of Education to continue his studies at the Palo Alto school. He received his master's degree in musical education at the University of Southern California last summer. During his absence, Patton McNaughton, former director of bands at the University of California at Los Angeles, will take over here in the instrumental department and as the director of the Adult Concert Orchestra. McNaughton was director of bands at UCLA for five years and bands for a year. He was the guest conductor here in February when the Torrance and Arroyo bands appeared in a joint concert.

50 Acres Grain Burned In Fire

Approximately 50 acres of standing barley hay was destroyed by a fire which threatened a 120-acre field at Main St. north of Lomita Blvd Sunday afternoon. Flames, which started in the north corner of the large field, quickly swept across the three-foot stand of grain and headed for an oil company truck dock at Lomita Blvd. Three engine companies and a fire patrol unit from the County Fire Department, and one Los Angeles fire company kept the blaze from wiping out the entire 120 acres. Owner Henry Fiesel, 427 W. Ocean Ave., Torrance, listed the loss of the grain at \$900, which was not insured. Cause of the fire is unknown. Friday afternoon motorists flocked to the scene, attracted by a column of smoke which was visible for more than 15 miles. Battalion Chief Harvey Crutchfield, of the County Fire Department, commanded the firefighters.

Youth Jailed For Attack On High School Boy

A 19-year old Gardena youth pleaded guilty Monday to assaulting a Torrance High School graduate several days prior to graduation, rendering him in such condition that he was unable to attend graduation services. Sentenced to spend 40 days in the county jail was Danny B. Willett, suspended 25 days of the jail stay and placed him on one year probation. Juvenile officer, Sgt. D. C. Cook, reported that Uria and a gang of other Gardena youths accosted 17-year-old Fred Guerra last June 9 near the Columbia beer plant. Two car loads of boys stopped him as he walked towards the Pueblo district and knocked him down, injuring his chest and cutting him about the mouth, Cook said. Uria refused to cooperate with authorities in giving them names of others who had participated in the gang fight. The Gardena boy admitted to striking Guerra once, but said he did not know the names of others who were riding with him in his car when the beating took place. Uria told Judge Willett that they had come to Torrance because they had been invited to "come down and make friends."
