Draft Deferred Students Told to Reapply for Fall

Male students attending El Camino College in a draft deferred status must reapply to retain the student draft classification, they were reminded yesterday by Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel at the college.

Quoting a U. S. defense information bulletin, Sloan said students planning to return to college next fall, or those wanting to study during the summer sessions, must complete four steps of procedure immediately.

1. Give notice in writing to their local draft boards that they are eligible and wish to continue student deferment status for another year.
2. State in writing to their local boards that they have requested the appropriate official of their college to send the board as promptly as possible the Selective Service Form 109 on class standing.
3. Request the college to send the completed SS Form 109 to the draft board.
4. Give the college the correct address of the board.
