

California Water Service Says No Soap to West Basin Testing

The California Water Service Co. has informed Paul Baumann, assistant chief engineer of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, that it will not sign a waiver in connection with the West Basin "barrier" test now being conducted by Baumann in this area to determine whether the inland flow of salt water from the ocean can be held back by forcing water into underground ground channels.

Vice-President Carl F. Mau has written Baumann that the water company's refusal to waive claims for damages is in the interest of protecting the water supply of the company's consumers in Hermosa and Redondo Beach. Because the company was informed by Los Angeles County Flood Control District that the injection of fresh water into test wells in Manhattan Beach, along the Santa Fe right-of-way, actually has caused a fan-like spread of salt water back inland, it was feared that contamination of company wells might result.

Wells Are Essential
These wells are essential to the company's service until the company is able, from an operational standpoint, to serve the area entirely with water from the Metropolitan Water District.

These experiments are highly technical in both theory and execution. In layman's language, they "recharge" certain existing wells with fresh water, on the theory that water which is forced into the test wells underground will form a barrier underground against the salt water which has been flowing inland during the past few years.

Water Flow Reversed
This inland flow of salt water has been caused by the greatly increased consumption of fresh water in this area due to the growth of both population and industry. When the underground level of fresh water is lowered, the natural flow of water is reversed and salt water flows inland.

However, as the California Water Service Co. points out, the first of these experiments, already conducted, drove a wave of salt water even farther eastward instead of westward toward the ocean. This threatens the wells from which the company delivers part of its supply to consumers.

The discovery of this by Baumann and his engineers in experimental operations until the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, working under auspices of the State of California in conducting the tests, could obtain waivers from the California Water Service Co. and other well owners in the area.

May Anticipate Damage
"The necessity of obtaining such waivers indicates that the engineers may anticipate damage to wells and aquifers which contain the water underground to the east of the experiment," Mau asserted.

"The California Water Service Co. favors any course of action which will improve the water supply. However, the company cannot agree to experiments which threaten to contaminate the water supply of its consumers. The company has the legal obligation to protect this water supply in every way in accordance with the State Public Utilities Commission Act under which it operates."



Yachtsmen Asked By Guard To Observe Safety Rules

With this year's pleasure boating season getting under way throughout Southern California, Capt. John Trebes, commander, 11th Coast Guard District, today urged yachtsmen to closely observe safety regulations on the water during the coming months.

He pointed out that, year after year, over twice as many boating accidents occur during the summer months than at any other time. Gasoline explosions, butane gas-stove explosions, fires, foundering, strandings, collisions and engine failures make up the summertime toll.

Captain Trebes outlined the following basic safety measures for yachtsmen:

1. Have a schedule with responsible people at home.
2. Cruise in pairs.
3. Carry at least a 10 per cent fuel reserve.
4. Keep craft seaworthy.
5. Assist others in distress.
6. Keep engines in good running condition.

One of the greatest dangers of yachting is the explosion of gasoline fumes aboard boats, according to the captain. He said that gasoline often enters the bilge of a vessel from overflow or leakage and quickly vaporizes. A tiny spark is all that is needed to set it off.

Ventilation Required
Coast Guard Motorboat Regulations require all vessels built, decked-over or re-engined after April 15, 1940, to be equipped with adequate bilge ventilation. The regulations also require a certain amount of fire-fighting equipment on this type of vessel.

Every craft leaving port is compelled to have a life preserver for every person aboard, according to the regulations. Laws passed since the end of World War II stipulate that all newly-made life preservers be dyed an orange color for ease of detection from air or surface craft. However, it was pointed out that white-colored life preservers are still approved for use as long as they pass the Coast Guard's inspection.

Coast Guard investigations over a period of years show that few people anticipate trouble when they put to sea and, therefore, are reluctant to provide themselves with enough lifesaving equipment. According to the Coast Guard, any vessel large enough should have some soft of floating equipment, such as a donut-type life float, in addition to the life preservers it is required to carry. A ring buoy, with a line attached, is recommended for those vessels too small to carry a donut float.

Booklet Published
The Coast Guard publishes and distributes to operators of motorboats, a booklet of motorboat regulations which specifies the firefighting and lifesaving equipment that vessels must carry. It also suggests safe methods of fueling, installing gasoline tanks and loading lines.

While there are no laws requiring operators of uninspected motorboats, not carrying passengers for hire, to be licensed, the law stipulates that no motorboat shall be operated in a reckless or negligent manner.
