uations which are compiled by the County Assessor's office will not be available until late in July or in August. The tax rate can be fixed officially at that time, Stevens said. To Lose Fines One notable loss of revenue during the coming year will be the court fines and forfeitures which will end with the abolishment of the city's municipal court on Jan. 1. Based on experience reported by other cities who have already transferred their courts, there will be a substantial decrease in revenue to the city, Stevens told the members of the Council. The city's court will be absorbed by the new South Bay Municipal Court District on the first of the year. Some monies will be returned to the city, Stevens explained later, but the amount will be considerably less.

Major item of the \$1,013,973 operating budget is salaries, which account for 75 per cent of the allocations. The budget estimate contains funds in the unappropriated reserve for a 5 per cent general increase in salaries for all employees as well as adjustments and changes created by new classifications.
