Torrance Hardware Offers Special Bride's Service

Something new for the brides of Torrance is being offered by Torrance Hardware starting this week. Called The Bridal Registry Service, this new program enables brides-to-be to place on record their selections in china, glass and silver plus other wedding gifts that they would like to own for their first home.

The new Registry Service is very simple and works like this. When a girl is about to announce her engagement or has set the wedding date, she is invited to visit Torrance Hardware's Bridal Registry desk. There, the bridal secretary, Mrs. C. V. Jones, will show her all the new patterns in china, glass and silver so that the bride can choose those designs and items which make a coordinated table setting of her choice. In this way, the bride will be able to try different combinations of styles and patterns to achieve the effect she would like to have on her own tables.

When the selections are made, they are recorded on a Bridal Registry sheet and placed in the Bridal Book at Torrance Hardware. These sheets will be kept up to date as gifts are selected so that customers can simply check them to see what the bride's preferences were and what items have not yet been given.

Mrs. Jones points out that this service is entirely free. They feel it will be a help to the bride in avoiding duplications and "white elephant" gifts. Also, it will be helpful for her friends to choose wedding gifts that they can be sure the bride would like to have in her home.

Past Noble Grand's Lead Rebekah Meet


Unusual was the word for the Trip Rebekah Lodge meeting held Wednesday in the California Hall. Past Noble Grand's were in charge of the session.
