First of 565 Homes to Open For Inspection

Although streets and sidewalks are yet to be completed, the first of 565 new Torrance homes representing more than \$5,000,000 in new construction will be ready for inspection this weekend, according to the builders, Bollenbacher and Kelton.

The new tract of two and three bedroom homes is located on Sepulveda Blvd. west of Hawthorne Blvd.

Price of the new homes, some with 1 1/2 baths, range from \$7000 to \$12,000, states Walter Bollenbacher, president.

The homes will be available to both GIs and non-veterans. Down payments are as low as \$350.

Adjacent to the tract, which will be called Allied Gardens, will be a 15-acre business section. The commercial zone is to be located on Sepulveda Blvd. at Hollywood-Palos Verdes Parkway.

Included in the tract of homes are nine different floor plans with a score of varying elevations.

Emphasis is on spacious center halls, large bedrooms and picture windows. Other features include paved porches, one and two-car garages, hardwood floors, weather stripping, sliding doors between kitchen and dining area, service porches, tile kitchens, lawns and shrubbery.

Will Rogers, Jr., will be Grand Marshal of a parade of over 1000 horses and riders. Cowboy star Rex Allen will join with music makers, Sons of the Pioneers, in presenting melodies of the range.

Nationally famous trick ropers and riders, including Montie and Maise Montana; Sam Garrett, the Blessing; Pat North, Anne Godshall, Verne Goodrich and Frank and Bernice can will add their bit to afternoon thrills.

Chariot and roman standing wces, colorful drill teams, mounted square dancers and rodeo dancers, and one of the biggest aggregations of trained high school horses are other events of this day out of the old West.
