Health Authority Tells Dangers Of Summertime Food Poisoning

Now that the summer months are here, the danger of food poisoning from the growth of a germ known as staphylococcus is greater than it is during the cooler season of the year. The room temperature during summer months provides excellent growing weather for most bacteria, and staphylococcus is no exception. Certain strains of this germ are capable of producing a poison in any food where they have an opportunity to multiply.

Ham, turkey, chicken, tongue, pork, cream-filled desserts and foods combined with mayonnaise are particularly subject to being poisoned unless they are stored under refrigeration adequate to prevent the mass multiplication of any staph which are present.

Of course, the first measure to be adopted in preventing food poisoning is to keep germs out of food in the first place. Unfortunately, as far as staphylococcus is concerned, this is easier said than done. These germs, which are responsible for about eight out of ten food poisonings, are widespread throughout the population. They are present in sore throats and nasal passages of those who have common colds. They are numerous in boils, infected cuts and burns, but they are also carried by individuals who are perfectly well. In fact, they are present

in or on from 75 to 85 per cent of the people. However, frequent handwashing and observance of other sanitary practices in the preparation and handling of food, together with the use of plenty of scalding rinse water for dishes and utensils can keep staph to a minimum. Proper refrigeration, 40 degrees or below, will take care of what few staph may survive. Although heat of 140 degrees will destroy the germ itself and therefore prevent its multiplication, the poison, once it is allowed to be produced by these germs cannot be destroyed even if boiled for as long as five hours.

California Employment Reaches Third Highest Mark in History

California employment, at 4,707,000-reached the third highest point in state history in June, James G. Bryant, director of the Department of Employment, and Paul Scharrerberg, director of the Department of Industrial Relations, said today in a joint mid-summer analysis of the labor market.

The figure, exceeded only by the all-time employment peaks of 33,000 over June, was estimated at 4,770,000 established in September and 4,785,000 reached in October of 1951, was 91,000 greater than for May of this year and 124,000 above the June 1951, statewide employment total.

While the settlement of trade disputes in the construction, transportation and communication industries contributed to the high employment mark, the figure would have been even higher except for trade disputes in other segments of the construction industry and disputes which currently are restricting activities in the steel and maritime industries, the analysis showed.

Unemployment Down
Unemployment was estimated at 171,000 in June, 10,000 lower than for the preceding month but 5,000 more than in June, 1951. Secondary effects of work stoppages, such as layoffs because of lack of materials, entry into the labor market of large numbers of students who have not yet found work, and continued immigration, were factors which resulted in higher unemployment in June in the face of record-breaking employment for that month.

Notwithstanding a sharp employment drop in the primary metal industries as a result of the steel situation, employment in manufacturing as a whole increased by 9,000 between May and June to an estimated 375,000. A pronounced seasonal rise in lumber and wood products and continued growth in aircraft employment were responsible for most of the increase.
