Developer Tells Plans for Tract Of 30 New Homes

A tract of 30 new homes is scheduled to be started within 30 days on a parcel of land adjacent to Madrona and Emerald Aves., according to the builders, James M. Dye, Inc. The new tract of two and three bedroom homes will be known as Paramount Park. The tentative tract map is soon to go before the Planning Commission for approval. The development will include 800-850-square foot two-bedroom homes and 1000-1100 square foot three-bedroom homes. The homes will be conventional and ranch style in design, according to Glenn Bohn, vice-president of the construction firm. Ed Elder, vice president, will be in charge of actual construction.

Ex-Cons Must Sign Up With PD

An ordinance requiring that persons convicted of certain crimes must register with the local police department was enacted by action of the City Council and is now in effect. Any person who is convicted of a felony either in California or another state must trot down to the local law office and file his name and address. And any person found guilty of violating certain other laws, felonies or not, also must register.

Crimes Enumerated
Included in the list of crimes are those which relate to the use, possession or distribution of any habit-forming drugs; possession or ownership of any concealed or deadly weapon; manufacture or possession of tear gas; and violation of any sex offense included in the Penal Code. Convicted persons who have had their convictions set aside by a court of law need not visit the police chief. The law provides that no convicted person shall remain within the city limits for five days without registering. Also, those who do not live within the city but who come to the city five times or more within a 30-day period must sign. Failure to register carries a penalty of a six-month jail stay or a \$300 fine—or both.

Army, Air Force Assign New Recruiter to Post Office

Sergeant First Class Tony Azevedo, veteran Army man, has been assigned to the Torrance Army and Air Force Recruiting Station replacing Sgt. L. L. Daniels, who has been transferred to Camp Cooke, Calif. It was revealed last week. Sgt. Azevedo enlisted in the Army "way back in October of 1941 and received his "basic" at Camp Roberts. His first overseas duty was in Africa, in October of the following year. He took part in action at Casa Blanca, Tunisia, Salerno, Anzio, Southern France, Rhine and in the invasion of Sicily, and at Hitler's fancy hideout, Berchtesgaden with the 3rd Infantry Division. He was discharged after the war, a free man for two months, and signed up again for a career. In the Korean conflict Azevedo spent eleven months overseas, returning to the states in June 1951. Holder of the Bronze Star with two oak clusters, Sgt. Azevedo also holds the good conduct ribbon, American Defense, Victory, Army of Occupation, American Theater, European with 10 battle stars, French Fourragere, Korean with 5 stars, United Nations, Korean Presidential Unit Citation, and U. S. Presidential Unit Citation. He and his wife, Myra, reside in Compton.

Jail Stay Meted Out To Reckless Drivers

Indication that motorists who misuse their driving privileges will be severely punished, was given Thursday when Judge Shidler tossed three youths in county jail for reckless driving violations. Sentenced to spend five days behind bars were Bruce Wright and Bob Mayer, both 19, whose addresses were listed as 3116 Via La Selva, Palos Verdes Estates, and Jack R. McFarland, 23, resident of a trailer park at 18000 S. Figueroa St. The first two were pinched by officer Don Hamilton after citizens complained that speeders were racing up and down winding Hollywood-Rivera streets. All were cited on a reckless driving charge. Judge Shidler, pinch-hitting in Torrance City Court for vacationing Judge Otto B. Willett, told the trio that the privilege to drive in Los Angeles County, where there is a great lack of public transportation, is a great privilege, and to misuse it is a serious offense. He warned them of the dangers involved in driving recklessly through a residential area, where children might be playing on the streets.

The area of floor space multiplied by eight feet (8') (this being the required distance of clear space between the floor and the ceiling) shall be the governing factor, and providing further that if any room is occupied by more than two persons the minimum required cubic space of the room shall be increased by not less than 500 cubic feet for each person in excess of such number which the room is designed, built, intended to, or does accommodate for sleeping purposes."

The Ordinance No. 462, as amended, except as amended herein, shall remain in full force and effect. Sec. 3. The City of Torrance is now undergoing an exceedingly rapid residential expansion and in order to protect buyers of such residential property and to provide for the general health, wealth and safety of the residents of the City of Torrance, the City Council of the City of Torrance hereby declares that the immediate adoption of such Ordinance is necessary for the public safety and general welfare, and that this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force immediately after the passage and adoption hereof. The City Clerk will certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper published, printed and circulated in the City of Torrance, and said newspaper is hereby designated for the purpose of introducing, approved and adopted this 29th day of July, 1952.

TORRANCE HERALD ORDINANCE NO. 608
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE PROHIBITING THE DYING OR COLORING OF DOMESTIC FOWLS OR ANIMALS
WHEREAS, it has been the practice of persons marketing the sale of domestic fowls and animals at Easter time and other special occasions, within the City of Torrance, to dye, color or offer for sale such domestic fowls or animals that have been dyed or colored; and WHEREAS, the great majority of such domestic fowls or animals have been purchased for children; and WHEREAS, this practice has resulted in the abuse of such domestic fowls and animals; and WHEREAS, it is the intention of the City Council to prohibit such practices in the future;
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE City of Torrance as follows:
Section 1. That no person, firm or corporation shall offer to sell, or otherwise dispose of birds, fowls or domestic animals which have been dyed or colored for the purpose of sale, and no person, firm or corporation shall dye or color any domestic fowls or domestic animals with the intent to offer same for sale.
Section 2. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) or six (6) months imprisonment in the County Jail of Los Angeles County or both, at the discretion of the Court.
Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after the date of its adoption, and prior to the expiration of fifteen (15) days from the passage thereof shall be published at least once in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in the City of Torrance. Introduced and approved this 29th day of July, 1952.
