



Highway Squads Hope to Reduce Highway Mishaps

Special squads of California Highway Patrolmen will soon be moving into areas around the state which have the most serious accident problems, patrol headquarters in Sacramento reported this week.

Designated as "special enforcement units," the squads will work closely with each area's regular patrol force in efforts to push the traffic death and injury curve downward.

Enforcement will be concentrated on the locations where and during the hours when most accidents occur and against the violations causing them.

Patrol Commissioner Clifford E. Peterson pointed out that more than 90 per cent of all fatal or injury accidents in California involve one or more Vehicle Code violations. "It follows that if we can halt violations we can also halt most of our needless and tragic deaths," he said. Funds granted by the last session of the State Legislature will allow the patrol to operate these special enforcement units on a year-round basis. They have been used successfully, but only occasionally, in the past. "We're still short of men on a statewide basis," Commissioner Peterson said, "but this program should enable us to improve the accident picture in the more critical areas."

Bob Masukawa Commended for Korean Service

Sgt. Bob S. Masukawa, whose wife, Mary, and parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tomosuki Masukawa, live at 1349 W. Lomita Blvd., has been awarded the Commendation Ribbon for meritorious service in Korea.

Sergeant Masukawa, who was an interrogator in the headquarters of the 3rd Infantry Division, was rotated to the United States in July.

Entering the Army in March 1951, Masukawa received basic training at Fort Ord before going overseas last September.

He was graduated from high school in Lomita in 1946. Prior to entering the Army, he was a hair-stylist.

The decoration was presented in recognition of Masukawa's service from Sept. 24, 1951 to June 26, 1952.

Harbor City Opposes Plan To Annex Area

C. F. King, president of the Harbor City Chamber of Commerce, has sent a protest to the City of Los Angeles against the proposed annexation by the City of Torrance of a small parcel of land near 236th St. and Western Ave.

Torrance officials have taken steps to annex this area of uninhabited land, but the people in the Harbor City area have voiced opposition to it.

The Los Angeles Council Planning Committee will hold a hearing on the protest some time in the future.

LA County Fair Souvenirs Here
