



Also to be featured at the new dining spot are Western Burgers. Among the conveniences offered by the new drive-in are parking spaces for 80 cars, counter space for a dozen persons, and fast, efficient car service. A complete fountain service will be offered and a merchants lunch will be a daily menu specialty, the operators say. Complete meals will be served. Although the building and parking areas have been completed, the area will be completely fenced in the near future. Hours at the new restaurant will be from 6 a.m. each morning until 2 a.m. through the week and until 3 a.m. on Saturday mornings. As an introduction offer, the kiddies will get ice cream and dad will get the bill next Saturday.

Check Health of Children Before They Return to School---Gilbert

In several weeks thousands of children in Los Angeles County will be trooping back to school. Some of them, as far as their health is concerned, will be handicapped in their efforts to compete with others. It is unfortunate that many children return to school each year with health handicaps which could have been eliminated, or at least minimized, during summer vacation. Typical of such defects, many of which are correctable or partly correctable, are decayed or infected teeth, nutritional inadequacies, defective vision or hearing, speech defects and skin disorders. Children Suffer Many children suffering from such handicaps fall to do the type of work they would be capable of doing were they in good physical condition and free from embarrassment which, for example, very often accompanies skin disorders, obesity or hearing defects. A child who cannot see the blackboard clearly or who cannot hear well is many times unjustly thought to be mentally slow. A child who is frequently absent from school because of continual colds or who is absent for dental appointments, made during the summer months, cannot be expected to get as much from classroom work as a child who is regular in attendance. During the remaining weeks of the present school vacation, parents would do well to see to it that their children enter school in good health or that plans are
