


CAMEL and a NEEDLE

Lions Governor To Visit Club Here Tuesday

Jack Stallings of San Fernando, district governor of District 4-D1 of Lions International, comprising about half of Los Angeles County and extending up to Bishop, will be the guest of the local Lions Club next Tuesday.

Governor Stallings took office July 1 and during his term of office will visit each of the 62 clubs in his district at least once before the year is over. He expects to travel close to 10,000 miles in his official capacity during the year.

Blind work is one of the major activities of the Lions clubs, but in addition the clubs in District 4, which comprises California and Nevada, each year conduct a Student Speakers Contest with a \$1500 scholarship given to the winner. Over 16,000 students were in the competition last year for this valuable award.
