Harbor JC Gives Adult Counseling

"Living is adjusting and adjustments are necessary every day of our lives."

So stated William H. McMasters, dean of admissions and guidance at Harbor Junior College in announcing that a continual program of counseling will be offered to adults in the harbor area.

"Finding a satisfactory solution to problems of vocational or educational choices generally fall into three main areas: (1) ability, (2) interest, and (3) temperament," said Dean McMasters. "Our testing program at Harbor Junior College will give the adult insight into these three areas; and when you add occupational information to this understanding, the adult will be able to make a much more intelligent choice regarding his educational and vocational plans."

Next battery of examinations pertaining to vocational interests, aptitude, and intelligence will be given Sept. 10 at 9 a.m. in the junior college library, Dean McMasters said.

The tests are offered freely to any adult living in the harbor area.

Last Aug. 8, 43 men and women took the examinations.


