Co-Workers Pay Final Tribute To National Supply Co. Veteran

Friends and co-workers this week paid final tribute to William Henninger, 53, National Supply Co. veteran, who died suddenly at his home at 14427 Corlett Ave., Compton, Saturday morning.

Mr. Henninger, head of National's cost department, had been at the company nearly 35 years and was on his annual vacation at the time of his death.

He leaves his widow, the former Marie McMaster of Torrance; one daughter, Alice; two sons, Paul and Jon, and one brother, Henry.

Beginning his employment here with Union Tool Co. here on May 4, 1918, Mr. Henninger rose to head of the cost department in 1925, the position he held until his death. As supervisor of the department, he was responsible for the accurate accumulation of vital cost information necessary for the efficient operation of the company.

He and Marie McMaster, who was also employed in the cost department of the company, were married in 1928.

He was president of the Enterprise Elementary School Board, the same school system which he attended as a youth.

A member of the St. Albert's Parish in Compton, Mr. Henninger was very active in the Holy Name Society and in young people's work with his church.

Rosary was recited, Monday evening and Requiem mass was celebrated at St. Albert's in Compton at 9 a.m. Tuesday. Interment was in All Souls Cemetery, Long Beach.


