## Boy Scouts Open National Drive To Get out Vote

First phase of the nationwide "Get Out the Vote" campaign of the Boy Scouts of America is in high gear here as local Boy Scout troops and Explorer units distribute colorful posters urging the public to "Register and Vote."

According to Rowland Erickson, activities chairman for Harbor Area Scout district, which covers this section, Scouts are placing the posters in store windows, offices, factories and shops—wherever employees and the general public might see them and be reminded that in order to vote Nov. 4 they must register before Sept. 11. Some 15,000 posters are going up in the Los Angeles Area Boy Scout Council territory.

**Non-Partisan**  
Erickson stated that the Scouts are conducting this gigantic vote drive in cooperation with the Freedom Foundation and that it is strictly non-partisan. The public is being advised to "Vote as you think—think as you vote." This slogan appears on the liberty-bell shaped doorknob hangers with which Scouts will blanket residential areas in the second phase of the drive just prior to the election.

Individual Scout units and districts are also involved in other pre-election activities. Some units are distributing cards listing registration points in their communities; others are cooperating with service clubs, labor organizations, etc. in promoting a hoped-for record national vote; and still others are arranging transportation, baby sitting, or other services for folks who will find it difficult to get to the polls Nov. 4.
