NE WINS GOLD HERALD CUP FOR 1952 WIN

Pitching his fourth no-hit no-run game of the season, hurler Hal Nelms tossed the National Electric nine to a 5-0 victory over Strescon to capture the 1952 City Industrial Softball championship, Wednesday night.

National took the first fray of the 23 playoff series 9-0 and Wednesday's clash settled the yearly debate. Strescon was winner of the B League championship, National the A.

Immediately after the action-filled finale, City Athletic Director Elmer Moon dished out miniature plaques to each participant in the championship affair, and Reid Bundy, managing editor of the Herald, verbally presented the Torrance Herald perpetual trophy.

Actual awarding of the tall golden moment will be made at a later date at the plant. Bundy said.

National's victory kept intact the record of wins listed on the trophy, no team having won it twice since it started making the rounds in 1948.

Success Story
The story of National's win is a real success story, with the Electric gang having come from the bottom rung last season to the top spot in 1952.

Strescon kept the National boys in line for the first four stanzas of Wednesday's clash, pitcher Steve Skowronski giving up but a single hit, a two-bagger by Frank Schmidt, first man of the night to bat.

Nelms got off to a poor start for National by walking John Mendez, first Strescon man to come to plate. But from there on out, big Hal dropped 'em like a rabbit hunter with an elephant gun. He fanned eighteen, walked one; only Jim Taylor, Arlie Parrish and Skowronski got to hit the seed, the first two flying out, Steve getting tossed out at first.

One Man On
Only man to get on base, except for Mendez' walk, was Manuel Cantu, who went down on an error by Ernie Floyd.

Scoring came after a well-planned effort. Jim Robertson getting to base on a bobble and Don Merrell sacrificing him to second. Ray Mendez sacrificed to bring in Jim, after he had stolen third.

Frank Schmidt made it to third, Ernie Floyd got to second, but Don Fulton socked a shortie to Mendez who tossed over to Dave Ek at first to retire the side.

In the closer, Merrell walked, Martinez popped up to Mendez. Schmidt got to first on a bunt, and Merrell raced home on an overthrow from Skowronski to Arlie Parrish at the plate.

Three Tally
Then Floyd got a free pass to base and Don Fulton bopped a single to tally Schmidt and advance Ernie to third. Nelms socked a sizzler to short, which was muffed, and Floyd pranced home. Then Dellan followed in Floyd's cleats, bringing in Fulton to wind up the scoring for the eve.

National currently has entered a Long Beach Recreation Department "major" tourney, and is slated to meet the House of Color-nine Tuesday evening at Long Beach.

Strescon has accepted an invitation of the County Department of Recreation and Parks to take part in a "minor" play off series being conducted presently.
