College President Appeals New Ruling On Draft Exemptions

An appeal for clarification of Selective Service regulations as applied to California junior college students had been sent by President Forest G. Murdock of El Camino College, president of the California Junior College Assn., to Major General Lewis B. Hershey, national director of selective service.

The appeal, Murdock said, resulted from a recent ruling by the California office of Selective Service in Sacramento in which a minimum of 15 semester units instead of 12 was established as the minimum program of study for the purposes of determining exemptions from military service.

At a recent meeting in Los Angeles with Lt. Col. Walter W. Henderson, California Chief of the Manpower Division of Selective Service, a policy toward so-called "terminal" courses was discussed, Murdock said. "Terminal courses," he explained, are those which ordinarily do not carry full "transfer credit" to four-year universities, but many of which may actually serve to prepare students for entrance into occupations directly upon graduation from the junior colleges.


The meeting in Los Angeles, attended by President George Dotson of Long Beach City College, President Craig Thomas of Compton College, and Murdock and Lt. Col. Henderson, was called for the purpose of making clear how the regulations are to be interpreted.

Murdock indicated that Selective Service officials here felt their ruling represented the final interpretation of the Selective Service legislation.

The objection raised by the California junior college administrators, Murdock said, resulted from the fact that similar limitations are not being established in other states.
