Wage Report Deadline Near, Official Warns

Friday, Oct. 31, is the deadline for filing California unemployment insurance wage reports and contribution returns covering the third quarter of the year. E. L. Funder, auditor in charge for the State Department of Employment in Long Beach, reminded employers yesterday.

Penalty and interest charges will be added to the amount of contributions if the report is filed after the deadline, Funder said. In addition, employers who are delinquent in paying their contributions may jeopardize their chances of earning a lower contribution rate for the next year.

Funder also reminded employers that under the California law employer and wage-earner contributions are limited to wages of \$3000 paid to an employee by each employer, whereas the Federal Insurance Contributions Act requires contributions on \$3600 of wages.

Deferment Test Application Due Soon, EC Warns

Men students at El Camino College have been advised that applications for the Dec. 4 and April 23, 1953 Selective Service College Qualification Test are now available at local draft boards.

Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel at Camino, said: "Eligible students who intend to take this test on either date should apply at once to their local boards for an application and bulletin of information."

Applications for the December 4 test must be postmarked no later than midnight, Nov. 1. Results of the test will be used by the draft board to help determine deferment.

Chamber of Commerce Recommends 'No' Vote On Proposition No. 10

Strong opposition to Proposition 10 on the November ballot was recommended this week in a resolution adopted at a meeting of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Pointing out that the proposition—which would prohibit the expenditure of public funds for an organization which has as one of its purposes the influencing of legislation—would destroy or severely damage a countless number of quasi-public agencies whose only purpose is the advancement of good government and the public interest, the directors urged a vote of "No" on the proposition next Nov. 4.

Robert I. Plomert Jr., president of the Chamber of Commerce, said passage of the proposition would destroy such agencies to which Torrance belongs as the League of California Cities, Shoreline Planning, Fire Chiefs', School Trustees', School Administrators' associations and such groups.

"Proposition 10 would cause the wasteful and extravagant expenditure of public funds to do individually what now may be economically achieved jointly by cities and chambers of commerce of California, including the state and its departments and agencies," the resolution read.

The Chamber is joined by most city officials and civic leaders in opposition to the proposition.
