Ball Fans Sound Off

The Torrance Herald: Baseball is America! Every town from New York to Glendale is proud to have teams representing its city, whether it be major league or semi-pro baseball.

The absence of semi-pro baseball in a city the size of Torrance is actually detrimental to the whole American baseball picture. It is even more disgraceful to have a very adequate baseball field (Municipal Park) within Torrance as idle as a cemetery every Sunday afternoon. It is also known that the city owns a flock of good uniforms from the Bluebird team of 1951—if the mothers haven't devoured them yet.

We, the undersigned, comprised the 1951 Bluebird team which won the championship and would be proud to represent this city again, if done properly. The Bluebird regime appeared headed in the right direction, but operated on a "shoestring" financially. The players even bought their own bats. The city finally decided that the cost of three new baseballs, umpire fees, and the expenses for a visiting team each week were too great and folded the team.

The city of Torrance should be able to afford an average of \$25 a week to conduct semi-pro baseball successfully. This amount would then be entirely forgotten if a "Joe DiMaggio" was produced. If the city feels that it can't afford semi-pro baseball, we feel that it should make an ambitious attempt to interest prominent citizens and corporations in backing a team. Perhaps the combination of all of these, representing semi-pro baseball for Torrance, and would like a meeting with the Torrance Recreation Commission. Help from your organization in obtaining this goal would be appreciated. Our committee would appreciate an opportunity to discuss this situation with you.

A semi-pro baseball team would represent Torrance as a city more than any other athletic team from the city. It would be composed of the better high school players, the old pros, and the semi-pros. The high school player would be given a chance to develop locally. He would also improve more quickly for high school baseball and, perhaps, major league stardom beyond—the goal of most all American youngsters.


