Local Department of Employment Outlines Vet Claim Conditions

Recent veterans of the armed forces who may be eligible to file claims for unemployment compensation under the Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952 after Oct. 14, yesterday were urged to visit the local office of the California Department of Employment and register for work if they are not working.

Mrs. Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance office, which is to handle claims under Title IV of the Act, covering payment of unemployment compensation, pointed out that several conditions must be met before veterans can become eligible for payments.

"This compensation is payable only to veterans who are unemployed because they cannot obtain a suitable job," Mrs. Ellis said. "One of the first requirements is that the unemployed veteran must register for work with the Department of Employment. Another is that he must be able to work, available for work, and actively seeking a job."

"Our office is currently seeking workers for such jobs as chemist, laboratory technicians, accountants, bookkeepers, typists, timekeepers, stenographers, sales, waitress, cooks, upholsterers, machinists, lathe operators, welders, electricians, inspectors, automobile mechanics and bodymen, jig builders, carpenters, T.V. servicemen, plasterers, sanders, rivet machine operators, electronic assemblers, all types of aircraft jobs, and others," she said.

Mrs. Ellis also urged the unemployed veteran to visit her office at 1628 Cravens Ave. and get information on how to establish his re-employment rights under the Selective Service Act. The local office manager said

the new veterans' unemployment compensation will provide benefits to a veteran who had 90 consecutive days of active service in any branch of the armed forces and was discharged on or after June 27, 1950 under conditions other than dishonorable. The total benefit amount is \$676, payable at \$26 for each full week of unemployment.

She also stated that the veteran cannot collect this unemployment compensation for the same period for which he is receiving mustering-out pay. Nor can he collect benefits while receiving education allowances or subsistence during on-the-job training.

In addition, if he has state wage credits that might make him eligible for benefits under any state unemployment insurance law, or the railroad unemployment insurance program, he must file a claim for such benefits. When the weekly benefit amount is \$25 or less, the difference may be paid under Title IV to bring his weekly benefits up to \$25. If he is disqualified under the state law, he will not be eligible for the veterans' compensation.

If the veteran still is unemployed after Oct. 14, and reports to the local employment office to file his claim, he should bring his discharge or separation papers, his social security card and a list of employers for whom he worked during the 18 months prior to his entering the service and up to the date of his claim.

"But he should report to the local employment office and register for work as quickly as possible," Mrs. Ellis said, "because there is a good chance that we may be able to find him just the kind of work he would like to do."

Adjust Driving Habits at Dusk, Motorists Told

Californians are two to three times as likely to die in traffic accidents at night than in the daytime, the California Highway Patrol said yesterday.

On a mileage basis the Patrol said that many more fatalities occur during darkness and pointed out that the approach of winter and the return to standard time have tacked on even more danger hours.

Out of almost 3000 fatal traffic accidents in California last year, more than half occurred during the hours of darkness when traffic volume was at its lowest.

"It should be obvious that we can't see as well at night, as we can in the daytime," Patrol officials said, "but far too many drivers fail to adjust their driving habits to the increased hazard."

driving, the Patrol suggested that motorists hold their speed at or below the point where they can stop within the range of their headlights.

"Imagine there's a brick wall always out in front of you, just beyond the most distant spot your headlights pick out. Then drive at a speed at which you know you can stop in time if something should really show up."

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
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
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
