Nurse-Pastor To Speak at Meeting Mon.

Miss Ethel King, since 1940 a missionary worker at Barnett Creek, Ky., will be guest speaker tomorrow evening at the Central Church of Evangelical United Brethren. The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m.

The Holy Shroud Subject of Talk Here Thursday

One May morning, 1898, photography was used to take a picture of an ancient linen 14 feet 3 inches in length, 3 feet 7 inches wide, called the Holy Shroud, and containing the outline of a human body — a shadowy sepia outline of a battered human body both front and back.

Evidently the linen had covered this body running from the feet to the head, then wrapping around the head, making a turn from head to feet.

This was the Holy Shroud of Turin.

"The negative taken that day in May, 1898, revealed that this linen was nothing less than a life-size negative of Christ," according to Dr. Paul C. Renaudo De Ville, an authority on the Holy Shroud.

The lecture is described in the Gospels as one thought by Joseph of Arimathea for the burial of Christ.

It is this linen and its extensive history, and also the results of the scientific researches made upon it, which will form the topic of a lecture to be presented at the Nativity Parish Hall, 1420 Cota Ave., Thursday evening beginning at 7:45.

The lecturer, Dr. De Ville, is one of the leading artist-photographers of California and he will present 150 original slides on this subject.

The lecture has been given in hundreds of cities throughout the world, but Dr. De Ville will present some material never before used when he speaks here Thursday evening.

"The public is invited to the lecture," Rev. P. J. McGuinness emphasized yesterday. He said a donation would be accepted.
