Samohi Bops Tartars In Hectic Loop Game

CRAWFORD PASSES, RUNS TO CAMINO WIN

A 1-yard hop through the line and a short 12-yard fling, both by Bill Crawford, were enough to jar loose the pillings from under the unbeaten Bakersfield Renegades as the El Camino Warriors turned up with a 14-6 upset victory Friday evening.

The Torrance Town folks, 10,000 of them, turned out to see their highly touted local squad perform, and they saw just that. But Coach Norm Verry gave 'em a peck at what the Warriors can do also.

Rated Fourth
Bakersfield was rated fourth in the nation among jaycees earlier in the week, while the Caminians were not listed among the top 30 teams of the nation.

QB Bill Crawford, who broke into his own last week in the San Diego lift, got credit for one of the two counters as he sneaked over from the one in the first quarter, then leveled to halfback Dick Hill in the third stanza for the second counter.

It was Camino from start to finish, but the clever backfielding of the hosts made it impossible to tell what was in the offering.

Crawford, Hill, big Jim Carmichael and Ken Swearingen were big guns of the night as they ran, tossed and kicked to the victory.

First tally came on an 80-yard march; the second on a 76-yard push. Two other TD tries missed the boat—but brother, they were close.

TD No Good
Crawford tossed to end Jerry Horn in what looked like a sure-fire 6-pointer, but officials said Horn was outside of the end zone when he snatched the ball. A fumble on the Gades 1-yard marker also muffed a scoring chance.

Burnell Jamerson, zippy Bakersfield back, was all that he was supposed to be, as he picked up 186 yards on the ground. His passing, usually a real threat, flopped for the eve.

Camino picked up 229 total yards on the ground, and wound up with 295 total net yards—running and throwing. Crawford himself tossed for 96 yards, completing 12 out of 17 tosses. He also scooted 135 yards through the line.

Jim Carmichael picked up a yard per try average for the night. Observers said that Crawford played a professional game at the signal calling post. He handed off to Hill and Carmichael when he wanted three or four yards, tossed to Horn and Hill for long gains, and carried the ball himself just for a twist.

Footers also pointed out that line play was the best of the year as large holes were ripped open on running plays.

Next week the Warriors have another home clash as Harbor Tech invades for a televised melee.

Ref's Toots Bring Brooklyn-Like Calls

Ronnie Knox and company, and a basket full of referees, headed the Torrance varsity crew a 35-7 stabbing in a Bay Loop mix-up on the Tartar field Friday night.

The melee, from the start till the last man was tossed from the game, was as wild and hectic as a Monday morning sale at the May Co. basement. It was the hardest and best performance turned in by the locals in 1952.

By far outshining most of the play of the night were a series of referee-player altercations which brought nothing but boisterous comment from the spectators.

A ruckus in front of the Tartar bench started a series of heated plays when a Samohi back drove the local's own Harry Bayless into the bench, some five yards back of the sidelines. Others on the scene weren't so happy with the move and gathered around to utter many comments.

Levy 15-Yard Fine
After the pushing and shoving was stopped, the refs marched off 15-yards against the locals.

Then, only seven plays later, with the Tartars safe on their own 22-yard line, QB Jim Farrar cocked his throwing arm and cut loose with a beautiful pass to Burt Smith along the far sidelines. But he bobbed the ball but managed to hang onto it and steamed across the goal line, where he was stopped.

When the yelling died down, the referee called for the seed back on the Torrance 38-yard line where he courageously admitted that the field judge had dropped his whistle—by mistake.

He later said he thought there was pass interference on the play—but as Smith made the catch, that wouldn't hold. However, a ref's toot is like a heavyweight's punch: one blow and you're through.

Fast Whistle
Then next down, just to top off the official's popularity, another fast whistle gave the Vikes the ball after a Samohi back intercepted a pass and fumbled it as he was hit—the ball being "recovered" by the Tartars.

But robbed or not—as in a ny fans thought the home squad was—Coach Jim Sutherland's outfit won by a big margin—it just should have been less.

Had the two Tartar touchdowns counted, it would have given Coach Cliff Graybehl's crew the distinction of having tallied more touchdowns than any other outfit so far this season.

Opening the game like they meant business, the locals took the kickoff and promptly romped to the SM 24-yard line, picking up three first downs in a row before they lost the ball on downs.

After a see-sawing ten plays, Santa Monica's Ronnie Knox jumped up, tossed one to brother Jack Douglas for 33 yards, and two plays later decided to run it across from the 7.

Tally Two More
Then came the heart-breakers—two in a row which broke the Tartars' back—but not their fighting spirit. One TD was made from the SM 27 as Knox hit Boyd Crawford, who rambled 73 yards for the counter.


The Tartars ground out their TD late in the third canto. Harry Bayless tucked the pill under his arm, darted through the left tackle slot and galloped 84 yards to the end zone, Larry Roy's place-kick cleared the uprights.

MOTORCYCLIST DIES IN CARRELL CRASH

A 21-year-old amateur motorcycle jockey was killed Friday night at Carrell Speedway when his cycle turned over three times and landed on his head in a pre-race warm-up.

Killed was Charles Booher, who was pronounced dead on arrival at Southside Community Hospital soon after the mishap occurred.

An estimated 2000 fans saw the death crash.

Fans said Booher, rated as a top-notch cycle driver, lost control of his bike on the south turn, turned over and rolled.

Four other novice drivers were warming up on the track but none was involved in the accident.

Booher's home was listed as Garden Grove. It was the second fatality of the year at the local speed track.

BEES DROPPED 32-22 IN 2ND LEAGUE MATCH

The Torrance Bees, after winning their first game of the season last week, lost a tough 32-22 decision to the Santa Monica Bees Thursday afternoon.

Santa Monica drew first blood when they scored early in the first quarter, but Tartar halfback Jerry Burns took a reverse handoff and scooped around end for sixty yards and a touchdown to tie the score at 7-7.

Trapped On Goal
A few minutes later, Tartar-bee Dennis Hester tackled a Samohi player behind the goal to give Torrance a safety and a 9-7 edge.

After a series of punts, Samohi scored from the local's 35-yard line to put Santa Monica ahead 13-9. At the start of the second quarter, Samohi continued to roll, scoring on a 60-yard TD pass to increase their lead to 19-9.

The Tartarabees began their own drive and climaxed it when Don Forth threw a beautiful 30-yard pass to Burns for the conversion to make it 19-16, still in favor of the visitors.

SM Interests
Torrance failed to score in the third period, but Santa Monica frayed. Menchers threw a desperation pass to Hester for a touchdown to make it 32-22 when the gun went off.

Charlie Babbitt, Fred Diesel, Skip Smith, Forth, Hester and Walt McHenry all turned in fine performances for Torrance.
