A Torrance friend of the Higgins-for-Judge Committee offers a suggestion.

It is one of those things so obvious-no one thought of it! "Look," he said, "the people of Torrance are all for fair play."

"There are a number of us who believe we should split the honors with your Beach Cities and place Judge Higgins on Bench 2."

"Now we recognize that Torrance and your Beach Cities compose what henceforth will be a permanent political unit. As such we are willing to share the honors and, as they jokingly say, keep peace in the family."

Sounds okay. Torrance and our Beach Cities do have much in common.

Like us, Torrance also wonders at failures to complete a single East-West arterial highway while North-South throughways multiply.

With a strip of Santa Monica Bay's golden strand under its jurisdiction, Torrance, too, is alarmed at the indirect proposal (promptly exposed last week by former Mayor and Councilman Perry Walker of Manhattan Beach) to build a \$60,000,000 addition to the new \$41,000,000 Los Angeles sewerage plant already a disgrace at Hyperion with its stench and pollution.

(Hyperion has admittedly broken down 18 times discharging raw sewage into Santa Monica Bay "for our kids to swim in.")

Our Torrance friend is right.

There is need for a strong political unit in this area able to stand up for its own rights.

Judge D. Clifford ("Cliff") Higgins was president of one of the most effective Chambers of Commerce Manhattan Beach ever had.

He was later president of the dynamic Harbor District Chambers of Commerce which includes the sweep of beach cities from Long Beach to El Segundo.

In addition to his excellent record in City, Justice and Municipal Courts, Judge Higgins is one of the best informed citizens in this area on the needs of our local communities.


Such a background can be a great asset for all of our citizens.
