Torrance Police Chief John Stroh last week received a letter from Mr. and Mrs. Cromwell while driving on Pacific Coast Hwy. The letter read: "Last week we had friends visiting us from Indiana. Mr. Warner of Palos Verdes Estates, suffered a fatal heart attack

and Mrs. Cyrus H. Weaver, both of whom had recently been ill and were traveling on doctor's orders. Early in the morning Oct. 21, after having spent the evening at our home, and while returning to their motel, Mr. Weaver was stricken with a heart attack.

"A kind motorist called us and also called your station for assistance. We hastened as possible and shortly after we reached them, Sgt. Swayne Johnson of your force arrived.

"He was most capable and understanding in handling a very trying situation, from quickly summoning an ambulance and fire department resuscitator, do-

ing all he could to doing at the hospital what none of us could bring ourselves to do—break the tragic news of death to Mrs. Weaver with gentleness and sympathy.


"We appreciate his kindness more than we can possibly tell you and feel that you are fortunate to have men of his caliber on your force.





**Booths Planned**  
A drive to increase the ticket sales will get under way Friday and Saturday when YMCA members will man ticket booths at the post office, Roth's Market and at Jim Dandy's Market at Torrance and Crenshaw Blvds.  
All of the proceeds from the breakfast will be spent in Torrance for Torrance youth. Plomert stressed this week as the final plans for the breakfast were discussed.
