



Gas Company Opens New Center Tomorrow

Torrance residents and those of Waveria, Lomita, Palos Verdes Estates, Rolling Hills, Redondo, Hermosa and Manhattan Beach will start drawing gas service tomorrow from the new base of Southern California Gas Co., L. E. Green, Southwest Division manager, announced yesterday.


The new, centrally-located headquarters is on 182nd St. just off Hawthorne, and is officially termed the 182nd St. base. Service and distribution crews will operate from the center.

According to Green, the new operating base is the latest unit in the company's long-term additions and betterments program, designed to keep pace with the rapid growth of Southern California.

"There has been an increase of about 9000 meters so far this year in the Southwest Division," Green said. "We had estimated about 7000."

No New Additions
To meet this increase, he continued, additional men have been added from time to time, although no new additions are planned to coincide with the moving into the new building.

Twenty-one customer servicemen under Foreman G. H. Miller will be moving from the aged and crowded Redondo Base, at 340 First St., Hermosa Beach, which will now be abandoned.

Christmas Mail Reaches Peak At Local Office

The volume of outgoing Christmas mail has reached its peak, Postmaster Clara A. Conner reported today.

As a result, the local post office is now mainly concerned with completing delivery of incoming Christmas cards and gift packages.

"Now we are entering the clean-up stage," said Mrs. Conner. "The Christmas mail has been heavier than ever this year. But I think everything can be delivered by Dec. 25, if the public will cooperate in a number of little ways."

Specifically, the postmaster recommends that everyone check his home address, as painted street numbers may have faded away, and clearly indicated addresses are important to temporary carriers.

Porch lights left on until 6 p.m. are a great help to the late-working mailman. Occupants of apartment houses are requested to place their full names and numbers on mail boxes. Dog owners should not let their pets run loose, for the animals may not recognize Santa in a grey uniform.

Postmaster Conner also expects a big rush from last-minute shoppers. For those who are still wrapping packages and addressing envelopes, she has this to say:

"If your presents and Christmas cards are going out-of-state, please ask at the post office before mailing them whether they should be sent by air mail or special delivery. All gifts should be insured or registered.

"Delivery of Christmas cards by Dec. 25 to local address is still possible, if first-class postage is used. Just make sure that each address bears the zone number and is easy to read.

Special Buses Set for Trip To Rose Parade

The Torrance Municipal Bus Lines is set to make your trip to the annual Rose Parade in Pasadena a snap on New Year's Day, residents were reminded yesterday by Bus Superintendent Marshall E. Chamberlain.

Special buses will leave the Torrance depot at 8:30 a.m. on New Year's Day and take passengers to the Pasadena Junior College campus at the intersection of Colorado and Hill St., the approximate center of the parade route.

The parade is slated to pass this intersection beginning at approximately 10:25 a.m., officials state.

Round trip fares from Torrance to Pasadena for the parade will be \$2.50, Chamberlain said. Grandstand seats will be available at \$4 apiece, he said. Chamberlain says he is now planning at least three buses for the trip and will add more if needed.

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
