

# Shadows on Celluloid May Warn Of Disease in Time for Cure

The public health campaign against tuberculosis, one of the oldest recorded diseases of man, goes on unceasingly. As a result, the "white plague" is no longer the great killer that it was recently as 1882, Robert Koch, one of the founders of the science of bacteriology and the man who discovered the tubercle bacillus, estimated that one-seventh of all people in the world died of tuberculosis. Although this appalling proportion still true of the vast Orient, conditions in other areas have changed greatly.

In the last fifty years, the death rate from tuberculosis in the United States has dropped from about eighty per cent, and now ranks seventh among the nation's ten most deadly diseases. One of the most effective tools available for the detection of tuberculosis, a disease from which no person is entirely immune, is the chest x-ray.

## Science Lesson Sermon Sunday On Sacramento

Inspiring proofs of the healing power of spiritual thinking are included in the Sunday lesson-sermon on "Sacramento" in all Christian Science churches.

This verse from I Corinthians (10:18) is the Golden Text: "The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ?"

Luke's Gospel (22:60-61) relates that when Jesus was betrayed in the Garden of Gethsemane, one of his followers "smote the servant of the high priest, and cut off his right ear. And Jesus answered and said, Suffer ye thus far. And He touched his ear, and healed him."

In "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" Mary Baker Eddy writes, "We cannot choose for ourselves, but must work out our salvation in the way Jesus taught." "First in the list of Christian duties, He taught His followers the healing power of Truth and Love." "His spirituality separated Him from sensuousness, and caused the selfish materialist to hate Him; but it was this spirituality which enabled Jesus to heal the sick, cast out evil, and raise the dead." Other Uses  
The x-ray film may also uncover other conditions which require attention. Heart abnormality and lung cancer are among the most important of these. A chest x-ray film of one local college student revealed cancer of the lung. Surgeons removed the diseased organ and recovery was complete and rapid. The disease had been allowed to advance. Later treatment would have been useless.

Anyone receiving a report of his chest x-ray findings, usually several weeks after the time it was taken, should not be alarmed if he is asked to come in for a second x-ray. The film is very small - no larger than a snapshot - and, if there is some slight abnormality, the film is not too easily read. It may simply reveal a perfectly harmless condition which has existed for many years. A larger film will show the shadows more clearly and this helps the doctor to determine whether tuberculosis is present or not. It is better to be sure. If something is wrong, early treatment is most important.
