

Redondo Beach simply annexed the uninhabited territory to completely surround Clifton Heights—leaving the residents no choice as to which city they wanted to join. Surrounded by Redondo Beach, they now have to annex to that city just the same as the residents who live in the huge tract in West Torrance when, and if they decide to join a city.
