In Clark's Market

Unique Location of Art Exhibit Casts Together Strange Combos

A chance remark led to one of the most unique art exhibits ever held in this area. Currently being displayed at Clark's Market at Crenshaw and Compton Blvds. are 123 paintings ranging in size from delicately painted miniatures to big and brusque heavy oils.

The unusual exhibit was arranged by Mark S. Schulman, president of the market chain, who happened to overhear a remark by an artist that there was no location in this area in which the many paintings by local artists could be displayed. Although it has never been done (so far as is known by the artists or the market management) Schulman arranged to have the paintings displayed throughout his super market. The result of this developed strange combinations. Most of the paintings are displayed in the vegetable section. Over the Zucchini squash hangs a brilliant watercolor of a dock scene; over the green beans hangs a heavy oil of a semi-nude Ball girl; and over the bin of coconuts hangs a brilliant and gay clown. While the showing is intended primarily to exhibit the paintings, they are also available for public viewing, each is marked by a price set by the artist and may be purchased. Prices range from \$15 to one at \$700. The paintings will be displayed every week day from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. and from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Sundays. Joel Harvey, advertising director for the popular chain of markets, said: "This is perhaps one of the most unique art exhibits ever attempted in this area. This brings art to the layman where he may view it at his convenience. There will be assembled the largest display of paintings by local artists, ever seen in this area. This will be one of the largest exhibits ever attempted and will uncover a great deal of talent in the area. Mr. Schulman has very generously agreed to allow the pictures to be sold if someone wishes to purchase them. He will turn over all the money to the artists to enable them to further their studies. Mr. Schulman is giving the public an opportunity to see fine works of art and giving the artists an excellent chance to display their talent." Schulman stated: "I am delighted to take part in a move of this kind which is uncovering the great artists of the community. Art patrons will be amazed by the fine work presented." The exhibit will continue for one month.
