

## Lesson-Sermon For Sunday on Love of God

Scientific healing rests today, as in Jesus' time, on the understanding that man's source is in God, Love. This is pointed out in the Bible lesson on "Love" to be read in all Christian Science churches on Sunday.

A selection from Jeremiah (9:24) constitutes the Golden Text: "Let him that glorieth glory in this, that he understandeth and knoweth me, that I am the Lord which exercise lovingkindness, judgment, and righteousness, in the earth."

Luke's Gospel records: "A certain blind man sat by the way side begging... and he cried, saying, Jesus, thou son of David, have mercy on me... And Jesus... asked him, Saying, What wilt thou that I shall do unto thee? And he said, Lord, that I may receive my sight. And Jesus said unto him, Receive thy sight; thy faith hath saved thee. And immediately he received his sight, and followed him, glorifying God" (Luke 18: 35, 38, 40-43).

"Divine Love always has met and always will meet every human need," declares Mary Baker Eddy in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures." She continues, "It is not well to imagine that Jesus demonstrated the divine power to heal only a select number or for a limited period of time, since to all mankind and in every hour, divine Love supplies all good" (p. 494).

## Glen Kendrick Returning Home

Army Pfc. Glen E. Kendrick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kendrick, 20926 Shearer Ave., is returning to the United States under the Army's rotation program after 18 months in the Far East.

He served in the 1st Cavalry Division, which spent 17 months in the front lines of Korea before being assigned to security duty in Japan late in 1951.

World War II veterans will remember this same division landed at Longuey Gulf on Luzon, Philippine Islands in early 1945 and raced south to help liberate Manila. American prisoners of war held at Santo Tomas University were freed by an advance column of the 1st Cavalry.
