CONGRESSMAN CECIL R. KING

The new and enlarged office of the 17th District now moved to a choice seniority location on the ground floor of the New House of Representatives Office Building is humming with activity. District problems getting top priority with considerable study and research spent on the daily flood of bills being introduced in Congress. . . and Congressman King, as ranking minority member, busy with regular sessions of the Ways and Means Subcommittee on Administration of the Internal Revenue Laws.

Income Tax
Tax bills have taken the lead in the new Congress—85 were introduced the day it convened. The range is from an 1 per cent cut in personal income tax effective June 30 (HR 1) to an immediate hike in exemptions from \$600 to \$1000 (HR 1971). Sharp controversy currently exists on the methods and timing of tax cuts within and between both parties, with much study in committee and debate on the floor expected before a satisfactory bill is finally agreed upon.

As the law now stands an 11 per cent cut in personal income taxes is scheduled to take effect next Jan. 1. This bill was passed by the 82nd Congress.

Aid for Redondo
All avenues of federal financing for the extension of the breakwater at Redondo Beach are being studied to assist the coastal city against repetition of the recent devastating storm action along its north beach. The support of Sen. William Knowland, Senate Appropriations Committee and Rep. Clarence Cannon, ranking member of the House Appropriations Committee, has been promised and currently enlarged photographs of the waterfront area, showing the before and after scenes, are being prepared for use in presentations to the two committees. Plans in the current drive to win an initial federal appropriation for the Redondo harbor project call for a direct appeal to the President if necessary.

introduced by Congressman King, H. R. 2111 is the most far-reaching and a continuation of his long record of legislation favoring the expansion of Social Security. The new bill is an amendment to the Social Security Act to provide that anyone receiving social security payments may secure a full-time job and still continue to draw the pension payments without further deductions.

Other bills recently introduced by your Congressman are:

H. R. 2282, which provides that the federal tax on admissions shall not apply to admissions to a moving-picture theater.

H. R. 2283, for the payment of \$45,944.24 to the City of Hawthorne in settlement for damage done by agencies of the United States during World War II to the facilities and installations of the Hawthorne Municipal Airport.

H. R. 2459, to exempt religious, veteran, educational and scientific organizations as well as state and city governments from the increase of from 1-cent to 1½-cents on mailing third class mail.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

Q.—Where do we now stand on the Tidelands Oil matter?
A.—Last year Congress voted the lands and oil to the states; but President Truman vetoed the measure. This year, in one of his last official acts, President Truman gave the disputed territory to the U. S. Navy by executive order. To date several dozen bills have been introduced in Congress, most of which, if enacted, would establish permanent state ownership of the tidelands.

WASHINGTON BRIEFS:
California's political prominence in the new Congress is now equal to Pennsylvania and second only to New York. Seven new Congressmen have been added from California, giving a total delegation of 30. As Social Security entered its 17th year of operation, some five million persons were receiving more than \$200 million in benefits each month. . . . The Commerce Department reports there are 4,000,000 business firms in the United States today, most of them less than five years old. . . . States now have a reserve fund of \$8.4 billion for unemployment insurance payments. . . . the number of persons 65 years and older has more than doubled in the past half century. . . . President Eisenhower was the first Republican President to address Congress in person since Calvin Coolidge in 1927. During his Presidency Herbert Hoover never addressed Congress in person.
