

Salvation Army Seeks Castoffs

Castoff articles in Torrance homes and garages can help to save the life of a homeless or handicapped man, according to J. Hugh Sherfey Jr., chairman of the annual Salvation Army Salvage Week campaign.

During the drive, April 13-18, a special fleet of Salvation Army Red Shield trucks will call at homes and offices to collect discarded materials which local residents wish to donate.

The articles will be reconditioned in workshops of the Salvation Army Social Service Center which serves this area, making possible the continuance of a social rehabilitation program.

Brigadier Hanson D. Gifford, manager of the center, said 61 discarded last year provided 258,000 hours of work therapy, 59,622 meals, 21,110 lodgings and substantial financial aid to needy and handicapped men.

The Salvation Army, a non-profit organization, helps lessen the tax-load by providing for men who otherwise would be required to seek county or state aid, Brigadier Gifford said.

He reported that the center has continuing need for discarded clothing, furniture, bedding, dishes, shoes, toys, stoves, radios, appliances, bric-a-brac, bicycles, rugs, rags and miscellaneous items.

Chairman Sherfey urged Torrance residents to telephone Torrance 3634 during the campaign to bring a Red Shield truck to home or office to collect discarded.

West Basin Officials To Meet

A meeting of the Executive Committee of West Basin Water Association will be held in the Association office, Hermosa Beach, on Monday evening, March 16, to give further consideration to the proposal that a water conservation zone be formed in the Basin under provisions of the Los Angeles County Flood Control Act.

The meeting will also be attended by representatives of the Metropolitan Water District, Cities of Los Angeles and Long Beach, the State Division of Water Resources, West Basin Municipal Water District and Los Angeles County Flood Control District.

Consideration will also be given to Senate Bill 91, introduced as an amendment to the Orange County Water District Act. The bill makes provision for levying an assessment against pumping in the Orange County Basin as a means of providing funds for purchase of imported water to be spread as replenishment to the over-drawn ground water basin. Some discussion has been held as to desirability of introducing a bill which would make the Orange County Plan available to other basins in Southern California. Attorneys have approved the Form of Petition for annexation of the City of Hawthorne. It is believed that required number of signatures will be obtained in time for the petition to be presented to the West Basin Municipal Water District Board of Directors at its meeting to be held on March 23.

Two more labor organizations this week joined—the growing list of labor and civic groups endorsing and pledging support for the re-election of Councilman John S. Gibson.


