

Local Boy Takes Korean Duty Tour



California Personal Property Taxes Higher Than In Other States

Taxes on personal property in California are very much higher than they are in other states.

California, west of the Rocky Mountains, is an important factor in the cost of doing business. Tax rates in the middle west and the east are even more important than geographical location and freight rates in the location and success of industrial establishments. The Pacific Coast of California is about two thousand miles from the Mississippi River, and about three thousand miles from the Atlantic Ocean. Because California is so far from most of the major markets of the United States, we ought to have the lowest possible taxes on productive enterprise to help overcome the costs of transportation to the great markets of the middle west and the east.

Taxes on Industry Passed On to Consumer

Taxes on industry are necessarily passed on to the consumer. The higher prices which must be charged for high-taxed California goods fall on the shoulders of everyone, rich and poor, employer and employee.

Delaware, Pennsylvania and New York Lead Industry Because of Lower Taxes

There is no tax on inventories (goods on hand) in Delaware. That is one of the reasons that Dupont, America's most powerful corporation, is located there. Pennsylvania leads in the steel business because there is no tax on the accumulation of ore, limestone, coal, and other raw materials for making steel, and likewise there is no tax there on work in progress, finished goods, or by-products. New York State, with no tax on inventories, leads both in manufacturing and wholesaling, in imports, exports, warehousing, and in a wide variety of businesses.

El Camino Planning For 10,000 by 1960

An estimated enrollment at El Camino College of nearly 10,000 students by 1960 was foreseen in a report made public this week by Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel at the college.

Using statistics supplied by the high schools in the junior college district as a basis for computing the anticipated increases, Sloan prepared a report for the college board of trustees which predicted that 1960 enrollment at the junior college would be about double the 4996 now enrolled.

Called Conservative

His figures which estimated that Torrance would have a high school enrollment of 2500 by 1960 were termed conservative by J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools here. Dr. Hull explained that the students now in Torrance schools would bring the high school enrollment to 2000 within five years.

Future growth of Torrance—which has shown no signs of slackening off this year—will bring the school population to levels undreamed of a decade ago.

Two High Schools

Plans for a new high school in North Torrance are nearly completed and another high school in South Torrance will undoubtedly be constructed before 1960.

Elsewhere in the report, Sloan described the philosophy of the college by saying:

"The purposes and main objectives of the college are to offer the best educational opportunities for the promotion of a democratic society and for the best personal development and satisfaction."




