

THS Offers Play In 5th South Bay Festival of Arts

The Torrance High School Players will present their prize winning play, "Sunday Costs Five Pesos," which won them a "superior" rating this year at the Pasadena Playhouse One-Act Play Festival, as part of the drama section of the fifth annual Festival of the Arts, which will be given by the South Bay Civic Symphony May 9 and 10 at Redondo Union High School.

The drama festival will begin Sunday evening, May 10, at 8 o'clock with the Palos Verdes Players presentation, "The Twelve Pound Look," a comedy by Sir James Barrie. The Torrance play will follow.

Hundreds of artists, musicians and dancers will take part in the Festival of the Arts, which is free to the public. There will be three festival programs and a continuous art exhibit occupying three of the largest high school buildings.

A feature of the art exhibit, which opens at noon and closes at 8 p.m. each day, is the "Art in Motion" section, in which potters, sculptors, jewelers and other artisans will create on the spot for onlookers.

Saturday at 8 p.m. the Symphony, under the direction of Elyse Aehle, will play Beethoven, Rossini, Lehar, Strauss, and Evert Allen will play a cello solo—"The Swan," by Saint Saens.

99 dancers will take part in the ballets, included in the festival will be the first choral festival to be held in the South Bay, Sunday at 3 p.m., 13 choruses and choirs, including the El Camino Chorus and the Palos Verdes College Chorus, will combine under the direction of Dr. W. Raymond Kendall, dean of the School of Music at the University of Southern California.

U.S. Steel Co. Tells of Upward Price Revisions

United States Steel Corporation and its general operating divisions, American Steel and Wire Division, Columbia-Geneva Steel Division and Tennessee Coal and Iron Division, this week announced price revisions covering: carbon hot-rolled bars; cold-finished bars and concrete reinforcing bars; carbon tube rounds; carbon rods, wire and wire products; and alloy bars and semi-finished steel.

These revisions are being made, for the most part, through adjustments in "extras" which have remained unchanged throughout recent years while under government price controls. Because of government ceilings, the corporation has been unable to make adjustments in "extras" to reflect the increased cost on additional operations involved in the production of the thousands of varieties of specific sizes, grades, finishes, etc., of its steel products.

While a few items have been reduced, the over-all effect of these revisions is an upward adjustment. It is extremely difficult to estimate the average effect of the advance as customers ordering pattern will undoubtedly be changed as a result of the revised price structure.

Bank Observes Founders Day
