

Officials of JC Taken On SC Gas Company Tour

As a feature of Public Schools Week, Junior College Administrators assembled in Los Angeles on Tuesday from all parts of Southern California to take a look into the world of business and thus obtain a further insight into how educational programs can be planned to best serve the needs of both students and of the community.

Representing this area was Carl G. Arfwedson of El Camino Junior College, who attended as guest of Lester E. Green, manager of Southern California Gas Company's Southwest Division.

The day's program consisted of an extensive tour of the Los Angeles facilities of Southern California Gas Companies, which together comprise the largest natural gas distribution system in the world.

Dr. Rosco C. Ingalls, director of East Los Angeles Junior College, coordinated arrangements for the tour with representatives of the two gas companies and issued invitations to the educators. As co-host, he assembled the group at East Los Angeles Junior College for a get-acquainted coffee hour at which he and Vice-President W. M. Jacobs of Southern California Gas Co. spoke a word of welcome before embarking on the day's activities.

Purpose of the tour was twofold: (1) to give the junior college administrators a first-hand view of the career opportunities that exist for young people in the widely diversified fields of activity involved in the operation of a big public utility company; and (2) in this way to assist the educators in planning curricula that will best meet the practical needs of business and of the community at large.

After inspecting the nearby distribution base of Southern California Gas Co. at Third and Woods Sts., and the 13-acre operating center of Southern Counties Gas Co. at 4900 Triggs St. in East Los Angeles, the group met for a luncheon at the headquarters office of the two companies at 810 S. Flower St. in downtown Los Angeles.

Guy W. Wadsworth Jr., vice-president and assistant general manager of Southern Counties Gas Co., as feature speaker, talked briefly on the part educators can play in inspiring and developing business and community leaders.

Following the luncheon, the administrators toured the facilities of the headquarters building. Then they proceeded to an inspection of the Spence Street Station from which the flow of gas from both Texas and California sources is directed to the various centers of distribution in Southern California.

Murder Mystery Author To Speak To Manuscripters

Jack Webb, author of "Big Sin" and "High Mesa," will be guest speaker at the May meeting of the Southwest Manuscripters, to be held at Clark Stadium, Valley Road, in Hermosa Beach at 8 p.m. on Friday, May 17. His topic will be "Writing the Murder Mystery."

Webb is a native of Long Beach and a graduate of Occidental College. "Big Sin," published by Rinehart and Company, and "High Mesa," published by E. P. Dutton, are two of his best known works.

Prior to its publication, "Big Sin" sold as a Catholic Book Club selection to the Thomas Moore Institute. Since publication, reprint rights have been sold to Signet Books for an initial printing of at least one quarter million copies. It has also been sold to English publishers and to Italian and Spanish for translation.

Predict United Jewish Welfare Fund To Hit Top
