Income Tax Cut Demanded

Approval of the action of Congressman King in voting for an income tax reduction of 10 per cent on June 30 and his demand for immediate reconsideration of the matter by Congress is evidenced by the flow of mail being received on the vital issue from the taxpayers of the 17th Congressional District.

Of the more than 5000 bills that have been introduced at this session of Congress, few will have more far reaching effects than H.R. 1 introduced by Chairman Reed of the House Ways and Means Committee, of which your Congressman is a ranking member.

On Feb. 16 this income-tax-reduction bill received a favorable vote by the Ways and Means Committee. The next usual step for a measure to reach the House floor is to have it cleared by the Rules Committee, but to date H.R. 1 remains bottled up by this group, Chairman Allen not having received approval of the House leadership.

In an attempt to get action on the bill, Chairman Reed filed with the Speaker of the House a discharge petition, which, if signed by 218 Congressmen, would bring the issue to a vote, and the 50 million taxpayers will know how each of their representatives stands on the reduction of taxes.

Congressman King stated on signing the discharge petition that "high taxes are killing initiative and not only will a tax reduction program act as an aid in stimulating investment expansion and the development of initiative, but it will provide a cushion for any slack in purchasing of new materials and goods."

Talk of Federal Sales Tax Hit
"A congressman is necessarily a watchman for the people. If in his position where his constituents have placed him, he is able to see storm clouds, it is his duty to warn the people of them."

With these remarks Congressman King this week roundly denounced any plan for a national sales tax.

Treasury officials are currently conducting a study for placing a federal tax at the retail level to be paid by shoppers at the time of purchase. Under such a plan Californians would find themselves paying a sales tax to the Federal State, and in most instances, to the cities.

In making known his opposition to a federal sales tax, Congressman King pointed out that under such a plan the burden of supporting our Federal Government would be shifted to a greater degree to the wage earner—the one least able to carry a greater load.

Although the federal sales tax plan is now only in the formative talking stage, Congressman King, as a member of the tax writing Ways and Means Committee, plans to closely watch and attack any progress of such a move.

Question of the Week
Q—What does it mean when a Congressman is reported to be "paired" for or against some measure when a record vote is taken on a measure?

A—"Pairing" is an agreement between members on opposite sides of an issue not to vote on roll call so anticipated absence of one or both will not affect the outcome of recorded voting. "Pairs" are not counted in vote totals.
